\$10,000 Fine, 5 Years in Jail Face Seven

A Reedy Creek Park official told of receiving "hush" money from men who were charged with running a 784 gallon whiskey still on the park premises as trial of seven men charged with liquor conspiracy opened in federal court in Durham Wednesday.

Raeferd F. McKinley, 40 year old Raleigh man and superintendent of the Negro state park, testified that he was paid by Wayland Henry Horton and James Franklin Ellis to ignore activities around the still.

Altogether seven men are on trial in charges of conspiring to operate a liquor still on Reedy Creek Park grounds, located between adjoining Umstead Park (for whites) and Morrisville.

Included are Ellis, superintendent of Umstead State Park, and Horton, former superintendent of Reedy Creek.

Others are James A. Nunn, of Durham, Lenwood J. Jackson, of Wake County, Otis D. Wadford, of Wake Forest, Lonless Fields, of Durham, his brother, William Fields. The latter three men are white.

43 Fined, Two Freed On Trespass Charges

Forty-three students were convicted and fined for trespassing and two were acquitted this week in trials connected with the current sit-down demonstrations in this area.

All convictions came in Raleigh where 43 Shaw University and St. Augustine's College students staged sit-down protests several weeks ago at downtown variety stores and at a shopping center.

Two of the 43 received fines of \$25 each and cost of court, while the remaining 41 were levied with fines of \$10 each and court costs.

FIRE HOSE TURNED ON

BISHOP COLLEGE STUDENTS

MARSHALL, Tex. — Fire hoses were turned on some several hundred Bishop College students here Wednesday when they jammed the courthouse to protest the arrest of 250 of their classmates who had been taken into custody following a sit-down demonstration.

The students, massed in front of the courthouse, were singing the National Anthem and other songs when they were sprayed by the fire hoses, causing them to disperse.

Suit Filed Seeking Entry by Race Dentists Into White Associations

CHARLOTTE—The first lawsuit filed in the South against professional organizations and societies which bar Negroes from membership reached the federal court here today. The action is against the North Carolina Dental Society and the Second District Dental Society of North Carolina.

The two associations are charging in this State of their ed with depriving Negro dentists residing in this State, of their rights to practice in local, state and federal clinics and hospitals.

The suit was filed this morning in the U. S. District Court on behalf of Dr. Reginald A. Hawkins, a prominent Negro dentist in this

city, by attorneys for the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund. It seeks an injunction restraining the two dental societies from continuing the practice of excluding qualified Negroes from membership.

The North Carolina Dental Association is the dominant professional dental organization in the state and is an affiliate of the American Dental Association, the single general professional association of dentists in the United States.

The Second District Dental Society is one of five state regional chapters in the NCDS and operates under the charter of the state association. No one can become a member of either the state or the national body unless he is first a member of the local association.

The by-laws of the Second District Dental Society require the endorsement of two active members before an applicant can be considered for membership. The

Clarence Hudson, a resident of Durham for the past 36 years, was buried Tuesday, March 29, following funeral services at St. Mark A. M. E. Zion Church.

The Rev. R. L. Speaks, St. Mark pastor, officiated at the services held at the church at two o'clock. He was assisted by the Rev. E. T. Browne, pastor of Mt. Vernon Baptist Church. Interment was at Beechwood cemetery.

Hudson died in Lincoln hospital on Saturday, Mar. 26 after a short illness. He was 69.

The deceased was born on Feb. 29, 1891 in York County, S. C. He was married in 1912 to the late Miss Bertha Alexander and they had five children.

He moved his family to Durham in 1924, and two years later, in 1926, went to work at Austin-Heaton company where he was em-

Swann Heads Group Second District Backs Robinson For Bishop

KITTRELL — The delegation from the second Episcopal District of the A. M. E. church voted to endorse the Rev. George Dewey Robinson as its candidate for the bishopric at the church general conference in Los Angeles in May.

This action came at a meeting of the 44 member delegation here last Thursday.

"This marks the first time in history that a district will present a solid front to work wholeheartedly for the election of an endorsed candidate, the Rev. Melvin Chester Swann said in explaining the group's action. Swann, pastor of St. Joseph's A. M. E. Church of Durham, was elected chairman of the delegation.

The Church is three short of its customary number of bishops. If the vacancies are filled, three new bishops will be elected.

Also during the meeting, delegates elected to the Episcopal Committee for the Second District W. L. Hildebrand, of Norfolk, Va., W. F. Mitchell, of Baltimore, Mrs. Gladys Grant, of Baltimore, and M. C. Ashe, of Rich Square.

Bishop Frank M. Reid, presiding prelate of the diocese, and six prelate of the second district, conducted the meeting.
