Michigan not to confer degrees during the summer session.
Dr. Speigner is the first Negro to receive a Ph.D. degree in Conservation and Resource Education at the University of Michigan and the first member of his race in the United States.
His dissertation is entitled "An Analysis of the Resource-Use Education of North Carolina College at Durham." He was praised very highly by his advisor, Dr. Richard L. Weaver "as being an excellent piece of research in Conservation and Resource Youth Education" pertaining to the Southern region of the United States.
During the year in which the North Carolina professor was on leave of absence to attend the University of Michigan, he served as a "teaching fellow in the Department of Conservation."
He was also elected in 1959 to Psi Sigma Society which is an International Honor Society whose members represent the various fields of biological sciences.
Dr. Speigner joined the faculty of North Carolina College as a professor of History in 1947. Formerly he had served as President of Martin Luther Institute, Tuscaloosa, Alabama. In 1948 he was appointed Director of the Division of Resource-Use Education by Dr. A. Honso Elder, N. C. College President. He has served the college in this capacity for the past twelve years.
The North Carolina College Conservation Educator has a distinguished educational career. He studied theology at Capital University (Ohio) and received his theological diploma in 1941 and was ordained to the Lutheran Ministry of the American Lutheran Church the same year.
Dr. Speigner holds the Bachelor of Arts Degree from Talladega College, the Master of Arts Degree from the State University of Iowa and the Doctor of Laws Degree from Luther College. Recently Dr. Speigner served as President of the American Teachers Association and the Piedmont District Teachers Association of N. C. T. A.
He is a member of the National Lutheran Council. He holds membership in many learned societies and professional organizations.
Dr. Speigner is married to the former Marie Elizabeth Jordon of Tuscaloosa, Alabama. Mrs. Speigner is an instructor in the Department of Social Science at Hillside High School. She received the Master of Arts Degree from North Carolina College. They have one son, Theodore, Speigner, Jr.

Davis, 34, and May Britt, 24, a young Swedish actress, had announced their plans to get married this week.
Sammy described the incident as the "most savage racial attack I have ever come across."
"This thing is the result of a lunatic fringe, but I never expected to see it here in England. This could never happen in the U. S.—maybe in the South, like Mississippi."
Davis said he hoped "news of this thing will not be spread all over the U. S. because this way it will only do me a lot of harm."
The young entertainer said he and Miss Britt would probably make their home in Los Angeles after her divorce is final. They hope to be married in London.

"This man walked in and asked what kind of sandwiches we had. Sloan told him that we didn't have any because we were closing up. I continued to take up the trash. Then I heard Sloan holler, kind of funny-like. I looked up and saw the man holding a gun on Sloan."
"I heard him say, 'give me everything you got.' Sloan said, 'here's the cash register; take everything.' He told Sloan, 'now, you give it to me.'"
"Sloan opened the cash register and moved back. He reached over the counter into the cash register and started taking out the money. He stuffed the paper money in his pockets. When he started taking the change, some of it fell to the floor. He took the change tray out and set it on the counter and emptied it into his pockets."
"Then he said, 'I guess you all will know me the next time you see me.' No, we won't, Sloan said. "The last man did," he replied. Then ordered me around behind the counter, he reached down to pick
