

Virginia Ministers, Church Choir Directors Gather at Hampton Inst.

HAMPTON, Va. — Over 300 ministers and approximately 150 choir directors will convene Monday, June 27, for a five-day conference and workshop on Hampton Institute's 92 year old college campus.

This year marks the 46th annual meeting of the interdenominational Ministers' Conference. Meeting concurrently on the college campus from June 27 to July 1, the Choir Directors and Organist Guild will observe their 28th anniversary — having held a workshop every year since 1934.

Five nationally prominent religious leaders will address the conference on social action, the

church as it relates to social values, cultural changes and the structure, preparation and delivery of a sermon.

The speakers on the program are Dr. Samuel DeWitt Proctor, newly appointed president of North Carolina A. and T. College and former president of Virginia Union University since 1955; Dr. George Arthur Buttrick, Harry Emerson Fosdick, visiting professor at Union Theological Seminary, New York; and Rev. J. Metz Rollins, Jr., staff representative for the department of social education and action of the Presbyterian Church, U. S. A.

"One took the upper road and is forever remembered as the world's greatest benefactor. The other took the low road and is forever remembered as the world's greatest failure."
