MAPLE NOG
(Makes about 1 quart)

1 1/2 cups Carnation instant nonfat dry milk crystals
3 cups water
1 egg, slightly beaten
1 1/2-ounce package maple-flavored rennet powder

Combine instant crystals and water; mix well. Heat to 110° (lukewarm). Gradually add to egg; mix well. Add rennet powder; mix until dissolved. Let stand 10 minutes. Chill until set. Beat with rotary-type beater, or blend in blender until foamy. If mixture separates on standing, beat or shake until blended before serving.
