BROOKLYN, N. Y. — According to the Rev. W. C. Sommerville, executive secretary of the Lott Carey Baptist Foreign Mission Convention, the Seventh Annual Christian Youth Seminar, sponsored by the convention will be held at Virginia Union University, Richmond, Va., June 3, 1966.
