## Europeans Threaten U. S. In Our Own Specialities

In the United States the 1960 Olympic squad is getting prepared for the forthcoming games in Rome August 24th. Coach Larry Snyder has his sights on capturing enough gold medals for the team championship.

While the Americans are getting ready the European track season moves forward. Results posted recently by the Europeans have greatly surpassed the wondrous performances of the U. S. athletes.

The strongest of the European challengers that will cause many worries for U.S. athletes is Germany. The Germans, the surprise of the Winter Olympics, have the personnel to make a similarly strong demonstration.

Armin Hary, who has done a world record of 10 second in the 100 meters, and Manfred Germar constitute a threat to America's spirit supremacy. Martin Lauer set the world record for the 110 meter hurdles last year with a 13.2 and Dr. Manfred Steinbach broad jumped farther than any man in history; (26 feet 8.63 inches) a week ago only to have it nullified by wind conditions.

Carl Kaufmann, a 24 year old athletic teacher, has done the 400 meter in 45.4, just two tenths of a second off the world mark of Lou Jones of America.

Siegfried Valentin recently bettered the world record for 1000 meters with 2:16.7 and will be stern competition in the either 800 or 1,500 meters. Hans Grodowski has the year's best time for 5,000 meters 13:49.2 and Gisela Birkemeyer, with a world record of 10.5 in the 80 meter hurdles could become the women's star of the dashes and is a possible triple medal winner.

America will offer Ray Norton, Dave Sime, Paul Winder and Frank Budd in the 100 meters. All of them have at one time or another a 10.3 in the 100 meters. They have to push extra hard to compare with the times posted by the Germans. The Americans are in a predicament at this stage. Norton has re-injured his back. Sime's legs are a liability. Budd and Winder lack experience and are spasmodic.

In the 200 meters Norton, Bobby Morrow, and Stone Johnson will have to compete with Peter Radford, of England, Livo Berruti of Italy and Jocelyn Delecour of France, who have times well under 21 flat in the 200 meters. All of the Americans qualifying times were over 21 seconds.

In the 110 yard hurdles Lee Calhoun, Hayes Jones and Chuck Cobb will have to challenge German's Martin Lauer. Lauer's 13.2 is the best ever recorded in this event. Calhoun holds the Olympic record of 13.5. Jones has the potential to equal Lauer's 13.2 in view of past experience as a sprinter. However, all will have to reckon with the talented veteran Calhoun, who will be seeking his second gold medal.

In the 400 meters Jack Yerman, Ted Woods and Eddie Southern will try and match quarter-miler Carl Kaufmann of Germany, who ran 45.4.

Milka Singh, an Indian running in Europe has recorded a 46 flat, Jack Yerman's winning time in the Olympic trials was 46.3, although he ran 46 flat in a heat.

To say the least, America hopes for winning the sprints have been darkened somewhat by the surprising showing of the Europeans. We will have to be at our best to beat them and pile valuable points in the short races because we do not expect to win the longer ones.

Americans will see some familiar faces when they arrive in Rome. Ed Temple, Women's Track coach at Tennessee State University, is coaching the U.S. Ladies Team. Dr. Tom Hart, of Howard University, is coaching the country of Ghana. Dr. Leroy Walker of North Carolina College is coaching Israel.

# Colleges To Set-Up National Titles

## Action Involves Seven Leagues

CHICAGO, Ill. — The 10th annual meeting of the National Athletic Steering Committee at Chicago's Washington Park Y.M.C.A. Friday, August 12 is expected to advance still further a steady and significant movement toward cooperation on the part of the nation's predominantly Negro athletic conferences representing 68 member institutions.

NASC Chairman, A. W. Mumford of Southern University and Executive Secretary, Charles D. Henry of Grambling, this week announced an agenda that calls for consideration of a national letter of intent, increased participation by all NASC colleges in tennis, golf, wrestling, cross-country, track and field and baseball. NASC Treasurer, C. J. Kincaide, of Tennessee A. and I. will give the report of his office early in the session.

Action to establish a plan to create the first mythical championship of NASC football and a proposal to hold inter-conference track and field meets before the national championship are expected to cause lively debate. Chairman Mumford said Charles A. Ray, Director of the CIAA News Bureau, would give a progress report on a plan to create a board of coaches to select the mythical NASC football champion.

Clarence E. Gaines, Athletic Director at Winston-Salem Teachers College where he also serves as track and basketball coach, will discuss the tentative plans for the pre-national track and field competitions.

## Tennis Lessons For Spectators Feature of ATA Tournament

HAMPTON, Va. — A second day feature of the week-long American Association National championship to be played at Hampton Institute August 16-20 will be a tennis clinic to be conducted by Bill Bos, varsity tennis coach at the U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Maryland.

This will be the second clinic that Bos will have conducted on the Virginia Peninsula within a month, his last appearance being at the James River Country Club on Sunday, June 26.

Dr. Herman N. Neilson, athletic director at the host college, explained that all spectators who come prepared to play will be able to receive individual instruction in the afternoon clinic, August 16.

"Coach Bos will demonstrate good form, all basic strokes and strategy of the game," he said. In the seasons of 1957-58, Bos estimated that he gave tennis instruction to more than 20,000 people, conducting 184 clinics throughout the East South. Since 1958 he has also served as an official at nearly every national tennis tournament as he is scheduled to do her next month.

Livingstone Football Team Will Meet Ten Opponents This Season

SALISBURY — The Livingstone College Blue Bears will undertake an ambitious 10-game schedule during the 1960 season according to information released by the Athletic Committee of the college here this week.

The squad of approximately 40 players including stalwarts from last year's team augmented by some highly touted freshmen prospects is scheduled to start drills on Thursday, Sept. 1.

On hand to greet them will be a new head football coach and athletic director, Charles R. Cox. Leaders of this year's squad are co-captains Arthur Barber, fleet tlbback from Rock Hill, S. C., and Chalmers Johnson, junior tackle from Concord, N. C.

The Bears will open their 10 game schedule playing Friendship College of Rock Hill, S. C., at home on Saturday, September 17. The remainder of the schedule shows:

## Althea And Darlene Hard In Exhibition

HAMPTON, Va. — Championship tennis competition will be capped by exhibition matches featuring two of the world's top tennis professionals Althea Gibson and Pauline Betz — in the 43rd annual American Tennis Association tournament, to be played August 15-20 at Hampton (Va.) Institute. Miss Gibson will play in a mixed doubles exhibition, together with selected ATA stalwarts, on the semi-final day of the week-long tournament, Friday, August 16.

She will meet Pauline Betz, former professional champion from 1947-50, in a women's singles exhibition on the final day of the tournament. This match will be one of the tourney highlights, for Miss Betz was unbeaten on tours and in professional tournaments until she lost to Althea Gibson this year in the World Professional tournament in Cleveland.

World champion Gibson won that critical match 7-5, 2-6, 7-5. She also is a member of this year's professional world women's doubles championship team.

On returning to the American Tennis Association tourney for exhibition play, Miss Gibson will be on familiar ground, for she held the ATA women's singles crown for ten consecutive years until 1947.

In private life, Pauline Betz is the wife of Bob Addie, sports columnist for the Washington, D. C., Post and baseball writer for Sporting News. She is a teaching professional at the Edgewood Club, Bethesda, Md.
