WASHINGTON, D. C.—Earl B. Dickerson, President of the Supreme Liberty Life Insurance Co. of Chicago, and John H. Wheeler, President of the Mechanics and Farmers Bank of Durham, N. C., have been named to the National Committee of Business and Professional Men and Women for Kennedy and Johnson. It was announced by Senator John F. Kennedy last week.

Dickerson met with Senator Kennedy at the first meeting of the new group last week in Washington, D. C. Governor Luther H. Hodges of North Carolina is honorary chairman of the business group.

WILMINGTON — The vanguard of the 36th annual session of the Interdenominational Ushers Association of North Carolina, which convenes here August 25-28, was expected to begin arriving here early Thursday morning with the remainder of the State's largest interdenominational organization to follow Friday, Saturday and Sunday.

The annual session is expected to reach its peak Sunday morning. Scene of this year's session is historic St. Stephen's A. M. E. Church of which the Rev. I. J. Miller is pastor.

During its annual sessions the Association has often featured some of the most outstanding business men and women of the race. This year the program will feature on Friday evening at eight o'clock, an address by Dr. J. H. Wheeler, president of the Mechanics and Farmers Bank of Durham and on Sunday afternoon the annual session will be addressed by Dr. A. T. Spaulding, president of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company of Durham.

Civil Rights Atty. To Travel In Dixie With Sen. Kennedy

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Frank H. Reeves, Assistant to Senator John F. Kennedy and Democratic National Committee member from the District of Columbia, will accompany Senator Kennedy on his campaign tours of the South.

Pierre Salinger, Senator Kennedy's press secretary, made this clear when questioned by newsmen on Friday. Senator Henry M. Jackson of Washington, the Chairman of the Democratic National Committee, revealed that Senator Kennedy had already scheduled campaign swings through North Carolina, Tennessee and Texas. (It was announced in Raleigh this week that he will be in N. C. in mid September) Frank Reeves is a well known Washington attorney who has handled many civil rights cases for the past several years. The conference, celebrating the organization's golden anniversary, will open on September 2 at the Commodore hotel. It closes on Sept. 8.

Scholastic Records Figure In Selections as 198 Are Rejected

Scholastic ability was one of the key factors in selection of seven more Negro students to attend "white" schools in Durham this fall. This fact was revealed to the TIMES by City Schools Superintendent Lew Hannen late this week. He made the comment in re-

leasing names of the seven whose application for transfer from all Negro schools to predominantly white schools were approved Wednesday night by the city board of Education. The Board approved transfer for three students to Durham High; two to Brogden Junior High and two to Carr Junior High.

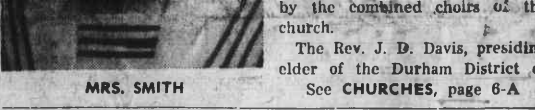
Transferred were Maximo Bledsoe, 12th grade, 607 Lee St.; Earl Mason, 11th grade, 1486 W. Club Boulevard, and Joyce Perry, 11th grade, 1102 Merland Avenue, from Hillside to Durham High; Betty Cameron, 9th grade, 1406 W. Club Boulevard, and Brenda Peterson, 8th grade, 1206 Berkeley St., from Whitfield to Brogden Junior High; Phyllis Gunn, 7th grade, 820 Thaxton avenue from Lyon Park to Carr Junior High, and Georgia Stephens, 8th grade, from Whitfield to Carr Junior High.

Hannen said parents of the seven would be notified of the transfers immediately. The notices were scheduled to be sent out late Thursday. In accepting the seven, the Board rejected 198 other requests for change of assignment. It is expected that parents for a majority of those whose children were turned down would appeal the Board decision sometime next week. North Carolina law provides for See SCHOLASTIC, page 6-A

3 WEEKS TO NOMINATE

Rush of Nominations Swells List of Beauticians to Sixty-two

Tarheel Man is Mentioned For Grand Ruler

CHICAGO, Ill.—Kemp F. Battle of Rocky Mount, N. C., was among the leading contenders for the post of Grand Exalted Ruler of the Elks, according to a highly placed Elks source as the organization's annual convention got underway here this week.

In a dispatch to the TIMES this week, J. B. Harren, Rocky Mount newsman and member of the official Elks staff, said Battle's name was mentioned along with those of Hobson Reynolds, of Philadelphia; Bertram Gregory, of Detroit; and Judge Perry Jackson of Cleveland, as possible successors to the ailing Robert M. STUDY DISCLOSES

Sit-ins, Dixie Politicos' Decline To Affect School Desegregation

ATLANTA, Ga. — The South's school segregation problem has been changed by "the revolt of Negro youth and the decline of Southern influence within national politics," the Southern Regional Council said Sunday. In a report on prospects for school desegregation in the 1960-61 term, the Council said that the "plodding gait of the law" on the school issue was a major cause of the sit-in movement. "Massive resistance," it declared, "had bred massive deter-

mination." It also predicted that, which ever party wins in November, "the strength of the national government will be increasingly, and decisively, applied against racial discrimination."

The report described the year of 1959-60 as "a period of recovery from crisis in some areas, and preparation for crisis in others." The Council reported in detail on five situations where school desegregation seems imminent.

Speaking of two of them, it said, "If the New Orleans defense of segregation has been characterized by conflict and passion, that of Houston has been marked by ingenious procrastination."

Of Knoxville, it said that "community opinion does not seem particularly aroused, but it is believed to be willing to accept desegregation in stride." Noting that the Dollarway District, near Pine Bluff, Ark., may be desegregated next month, the Council said that "if on the history of its conflict to date would suggest the possibility of another challenge to law and order."
