Bishop Stewart to Give Sermon Sunday at Clinton Chapel AMEZ

NEW BERN — Bishop William Andrew Stewart, presiding prelate of the Fifth Episcopal District of the A. M. E. Zion Church, will preach at Clinton Chapel, A. M. E. Zion Church here Sunday at 11 A. M. A native Alabamian, he was elevated to the bishopric in Zion Methodism in 1952.

One of the most honored clergymen in the whole of his denomination, he has traveled extensively throughout the world. He was one of the top delegates to the Ecumenical Conference of world Methodists in London, England in 1951, and was special representative of the church to Ghana in 1958. While in that country, he was a guest of Dr. Kwame Nkrumah, Ghana Premier, several times.

One of his staunch African friends is President H. V. S. Tubman of Liberia. It was his talks with the African statesman which finally led to the election of a native African to the bishopric in the A. M. E. Zion Church. Dr. S. Dome Lartey, Post Master General of Liberia, and an eminent minister, was made a bishop last May in

Chapel Hill; Mr. and Mrs. Tread Lee of Portsmouth, Va.; Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Alston of Newark, N. J.; Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Parker, Thomas Parker, Michael Parker of Durham.
