Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority To Show Ebony Fashion Fair in Durham Oct. 11

Alpha Zeta Omega Chapter of Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority presents Ebony Fashion Fair here on October 11 at Hillside High School.

The show, the only one of its kind in the direction of Mrs. Freda DeKnight, Fashion Coordinator and Home Service Director for Ebony Magazine, Mrs. Katherine C. Thomas, chairman of the committee, 1714 Concord St., announced that net proceeds realized from the show in Durham will go to Lincoln Hospital and scholarships at N. C. College.

Mrs. Jessie D. Kearney, publicity chairman, stated that arrangements are underway to fill the Hillside High School auditorium for the show. A brief history of the show indicates that from a modest beginning in 1938, when 30 cities were covered, the 1940 tour will exceed 52 cities from coast to coast.

The show began as a local series of fall showings of high fashions from world famous designers. Mrs. DeKnight spent the summer in New York, Rome, Florence and Paris selecting the more than 200 creations to be shown this year. Ten of the loveliest Negro models plus two handsome male models will be featured in the show.

Proceeds from each show are donated to worthy charities designated by the sponsoring group. In 1939 some \$75,000 was raised through ticket sales and was donated to such charitable organizations as United Negro College Fund, Urban League, Community Hospital, Mental Health and Scholarship Funds. Tickets are selling for \$3.50.

Members of the Alpha Zeta Omega Chapter are now maintaining two full scholarships at N. C. College, a Loan Fund, a Clothes Closet, a Shoe Fund and a Patient's Supply Closet. Recently the chapter gave several Thermo-Serv pitchers and an incubator to Lincoln Hospital.

WOMAN TO WOMAN

Leather season is here again. Here are some hints for caring for your leather accessories.

CALF AND COWHIDE SHOES
1. With stiff shoe brush, brush off dry dust and dirt.
2. Wipe on oil base polish in thin, even film. (Liquid polish may be applied evenly then wiped with flannel).
3. Using a soft polishing cloth, apply enough force to rub paste into leather, then add a bit more and rub to a high polish.

SUEDE NAP, BUCKSKIN
1. Gently remove dust and soil with stiff brush.
2. Brush up nap gently freeing it of grit.
3. Apply specially prepared liquid dressing, following directions on bottle.
Wipe off edge of sole with damp cloth.

LIZARD, SNAKE, ALLIGATOR SKINS
Use only preparations designed for this type of leather. Apply

with soft flannel cloth.

LEATHER GLOVES
(Except Doeskin and Chamols)
1. Wash in cool suds on hands.
2. Use brush for badly soiled spots.
3. Roll down from wrists when clean. (do not pull from fingers).
4. After rinsing in cool water, follow by rinse in light fresh suds.
5. Roll in turkish towel from finger tips toward cuffs, kneading for few minutes.
6. Blow fingers into shape and hand up to dry away from heat.
7. By finger pressing, soften leather while still damp.

LEATHER HANDBAGS
1. Clean badly soiled bags with mild soap and water before waxing.
2. To keep in condition use special lotion, or saddle soap at night with polishing in the morning.
3. When not in use, store in drawer wrapped in tissue paper.

director, listed premature childbirth and perinatal mortality as the institute's two major problems and asked the delegation's help in providing information on hereditary clinics and painless childbirth.

Disclosing that there are some 250,000 legal and illegal abortions annually in Poland, Dr. Lesinski said the institute's most significant contributions to medicine were the organization of pre-natal clinics throughout the country and the stimulation of changes in social attitudes toward childbirth.

The NMA doctors were also guests at a reception in the Medical Union building where they were told that private physicians in Poland must serve at least five to seven hours a day in state hospitals.

AMBASSADORS OF GOOD WILL

Declaring that doctors could well serve as ambassadors of good will, Dr. Mazique said "much more good will and understanding will be carried in the hands and medical bags of those who have healing in their hearts than can be carried in the portfolios of diplomats."

New Teachers at St. Aug.

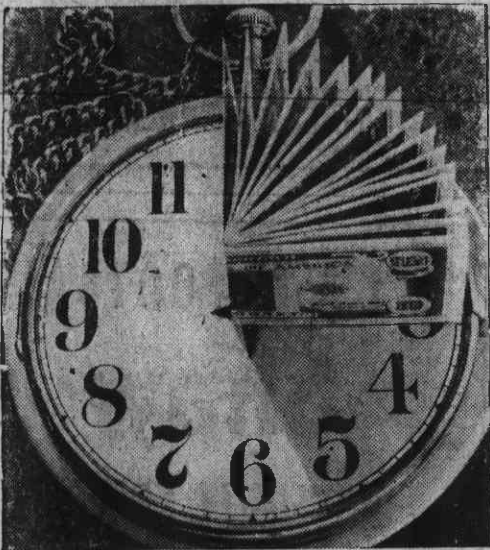
RALEIGH — The following new additions to St. Augustine's faculty were announced this week by President James A. Boyer:
