White Pupils in Ga. Sue To Enter School

A suit supported by the American Civil Liberties Union was filed Monday in the Federal District Court in Macon, Ga., charging that three white children have been denied admission to the American, Ga. High School because their families are members of the Koinonia community.

The Koinonia group is a religious fellowship which believes in non-violence and racial equality as Christian concepts. The community has been under heavy pressure in recent years, including shootings and economic reprisals, because of its anti-discrimination stand.

A cooperating attorney of the American Civil Liberties Union, William R. Harrell of Macon, filed suit against the American School Board, in behalf of two girls, Lora Ruth Browne, 13, and Jane Jordan, 13, and one boy, William White kamper, 15.
