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## "NIXON BEST FOR US"—JACKIE

Ex-Baseball Star Supports GOP Hope In Durham Speech

Former Brooklyn Dodger baseball star Jackie Robinson said here Sunday night that Republican candidate Richard Nixon is the best man for the job of president for the next four years.

"I'm not a Republican, I'm not a Democrat. But I'm here tonight because I think Nixon is the better man for us."

Robinson made this statement in a speech before some 900 persons who crowded Mt. Vernon Baptist Church to attend a Republican rally.

The restaurant executive was the main speaker at the gathering which heard three other speakers criticize the long hold of the Democratic party on this region.

The graying former baseball great who opened the door to Negro athletes in professional baseball, based his decision in favor of Nixon over Kennedy largely on the basis of personal encounters with the two men.

In describing his meeting with Democratic presidential candidate John F. Kennedy, Robinson said the Massachusetts Senator hedged on question about his relations with Alabama Governor Patterson and White Citizens Council leader Sam-Englehardt.

## NAACP Quizzes Kennedy And Nixon on Civil Rights Issue

NEW YORK—Presidential candidates Richard M. Nixon and John F. Kennedy are asked if they would use their powers as chief executive to end all segregation and discrimination in every program utilizing federal funds in any form today.

The questions are asked in a questionnaire sent them by the Leadership Conference on Civil Rights, chaired by NAACP Executive Secretary Roy Wilkins and made up of nearly 50 national, civic, fraternal, religious and labor organizations.

Questionnaire, are a means of calling for positive pledges for meaningful action on civil rights in the upcoming 87th Congress, are being sent to all carry-over Senators and candidates for seats in both houses of Congress.

The Leadership Conference will

publicize findings on October 24. A questionnaire identical to those sent presidential candidates, running mates and congressmen, is enclosed for your information and use.

Partial letter to presidential candidates follows. A modified version was sent to vice presidential aspirants.

Enclosed is a copy of a questionnaire on civil rights which we have sent today to members of the Senate and to all candidates for the Senate and the House of Representatives.

As you will note, the questionnaire sets forth a number of proposals for legislation and for rules and procedures to assure that such legislation may be brought to a vote. Taken together, these constitute what we believe to be a minimum program for meaningful civil rights action by the Congress.

## Three Trying For Grid Team as Yancey Integration Made Calmly

## Political Action Main Theme of NAACP Session

GREENSBORO—This city, famous as the beachhead of the 1960 Students' Sit-in Demonstration which resulted in the elimination of segregated eating facilities in some 112 cities of the South, was host to the 17th Annual Convention of the N. C. NAACP Conference October 13-16.

Close to one hundred ministers came Thursday for the one-day special. Ministers pledged a closer cooperation with the NAACP in all areas of civil rights action with the major accent on membership and registration and voting campaign.

During Friday and Saturday, there were one hundred adult delegates registered, and another hundred college and youth chapter delegates in attendance under the guidance of Dr. Marguerite Adams, Raleigh college professor, and Herbert L. Wright, youth department secretary, New York.

Much interest and enthusiasm was shown by the youths as they reviewed the results of their effective sit-in, swim-in, kneel-in and other forms of protests this year. State NAACP president Kelly

Three of the seven students who were admitted to all white schools in Yancey County were trying out for the football team before the first week was over.

The seven enrolled in two formerly all-white schools in the western North Carolina mountain county Monday. They were the first to be integrated under a federal court order.

Originally, federal Judge Wilson Warlick ordered the county to admit ten students whose parents were plaintiffs in a suit against the county school board.

Three of the ten attending out of state schools, two in South Carolina, and another in New York.

The case with which the change-over took place Mon. was apparent in the fact that before the first day was over, John Yancey Jackson, one of the seven Negro students, was running at end on the varsity of the Cane River High School football team, and Louis Young was working out with the junior varsity.

Over at East Yancey, John Horton was expected to join the football team there on Wednesday.

At Cane River, Jackson enrolled in the 11th grade, Young, Rose Roland and Carolyn Young registered for the ninth grade. At East Yancey, Horton registered for the 10th grade and Marvin and Shirley Barnett entered the ninth grade.

Admission of the Negro students took place so smoothly that at Burnsville, which lies be-

She was married to the late Steve Steele, and they had nine children. She later married the late George Taylor.

Mrs. Taylor came to Durham in 1922 where she lived until her death.

She joined the Bethel Tabernacle when she first came to the city, and later became a member of the Mt. Zion Holiness, now New Covenant. She was a faithful member until her death.

A jubilant host of Council members and interested citizens composed the throng that assembled to celebrate the integration of the Kress lunch counter after an eight-month-long picketing attack.

Picketing of Kress' began after 29 members of the NAACP youth body were arrested early this year after sit-in demonstrations at Kress' and the Clark Drug Store. Clark's has refused all moves toward integration.

Many of the demonstrators were on hand to mark the celebration of victory at the variety store.

Charles Bell, president of the NAACP Youth organization, presided at the Rally. He frequently
