EDITOR'S NOTE: The following statement was written by Mr. Stewart and Mr. Wheeler, approved by presidents of five labor unions and four Durham precinct chairmen. Mr. Wheeler is a member of the National Business and Professional Men for Kennedy and Johnson, while Mr. Stewart is a member of the National Democratic Speakers Bureau and State Coordinator for the party.

Without question our destiny as a minority group must be tied to progressive and liberal movements. On the basis of its past record and on the strength of its program for the future, the Democratic Party is the one major political group in our union which stands for progressive and liberal government. It has brought forth practically all of the important progressive and liberal movements whose benefits we now enjoy. The older citizens of our country can recall first-hand that the first real extension of modern democracy to all our people was begun in our time in the early thirties under the late Franklin D. Roosevelt. It was Roosevelt and the Democratic Party who wrote into our national life the economic and social safe-

EDITORIAL The Negro Voter Faces A Great Decision In Tuesday Election

For how can I endure to see the evil that shall come unto my people? or how can I endure to see the destruction of my kindred? —Ezra . . .

For approximately 40 years the Carolina Times has endeavored to the best of its ability to cry aloud in North Carolina and the South against those who would deny freedom and equal opportunities to any and all oppressed people. To say that the road we have chosen has been a hard one is putting it lightly. It has not only been hard; it has at times been painful, humiliating and bitter; as it has ever been through the ages the lot of those who blaze new paths, point to new horizons and are agents of prophecy. Because we have paid the price and because over the years we have refused again and again to flatter at the flesh pots, we feel that we not only have the right to speak out in this crucial hour now facing the Negro voters of North Carolina and the South but that it is our bounden duty to do so.

For a little more than 60 years North Carolina and the other southern states have been controlled, lock, stock, and barrel, by the Democrat Party. Whatever rights have been denied the Negro citizens of this area have been denied at the hands of this same party whose reign in the South has been practically unhampered or uninterrupted for over a half century. Likewise, what opportunities the Negroes of the South have enjoyed, if they can be said to have enjoyed any at all, have been at the hands of the Democrat Party.

If the Negro has been the victim of unequal schools, as the result of segregation, if he has been forced to live in the worst sections of the cities and towns, to labor at the lowest wages, if he has been lynched and mistreated in the courts and made to suffer other injustices, the pattern has been set and nurtured solely by the Democrat Party. If in many of the southern states the Negro is still denied the right to vote, the responsibility has been and still is that of the Democrat Party. (See THE NEGRO VOTER, 2-A)

K. P. Battle and Mrs. Letitia Smith, presidents of the respective male and female Elks units, in charge.

The sessions were confined to executive board meetings of the two groups on Saturday, along with a dinner and an evening dance-social at Page's auditorium. Sunday morning a breakfast meeting was held at the Elks on Fayetteville Street.

The Rev. Otis E. Dunn, State and Assistant Grand Chaplain, Asheville, delivered a spiritual message at the morning worship. This was followed by the address of president Battle, and remarks by Mrs. Smith.

Alexander Barnes, a race Republican leader of this city, was presented on behalf of the advocates of a 'two-party' political system in Tarheelia. Barnes said that Negroes "divide their votes" and not

Ex-Durhamite Shot To Death In New Jersey

A 28 year old Durhamite who had lived in New Jersey for the past 18 months was returned to his home town for funeral services Wednesday.

Carl Carpenter was buried in Beechwood cemetery following rites at the Gethsemane Baptist Church on Wednesday afternoon. The Rev. N. A. Trice presided.

Carpenter was shot to death on a street in Newark, New Jersey late Saturday evening.

Newark police Sergeant E. C. Beurie said Calvin Norton, Carpenter's brother-in-law, is being held for murder pending grand jury action.

Beurie said the shooting took place in the 81 block of 10th avenue, a few feet from Carpenter's home.

The slain man sustained several bullet wounds, one of which entered his head. A small caliber revolver was used in the shooting.

Wreck Fatal To Youth; Two Companions Hurt

Funeral services for Eugene Bass, 22 year old resident of Rougemont, were scheduled to be held Thursday afternoon at the St. James Baptist Church, at two o'clock.

Bass was killed when his automobile zoomed out of control on a rural road about two and one half miles east of Rougemont.

His two traveling companions, James Lee Lunsford, 22, and Ben Junior Parker, 22, were injured in the wreck.

The Rev. A. A. Chavis, pastor of St. James, was to preside at funeral services. Burial was slated for the church cemetery.

According to investigating state Patrolmen, Bass' car left the road on the right side, swerved across the road and overturned at least

Boy Burns House, Kills Elderly Owner

At least four North Carolinians met violent deaths in shootings, stabbings and traffic accidents this week.

Two died as the result of shootings, one from a stab wound and a fourth in a fatal automobile accident.

Robert Williams, 23 year old Durhamite, was stabbed to death by his wife on Friday. (See details, this page)

Carl Carpenter, former Durhamite, was shot down on the streets of Newark, New Jersey late Saturday. (See this page, also)

Eugene Bass, young resident of a rural area north of Durham, died in an auto crash Sunday. (Bass story appears on this page)

In Bryson City, a 13 year old schoolboy admitted burning down the house of an elderly bus driver then shooting him to death as he searched the ruins of his home.

Police were holding young James McDonald this week in the arson-murder Sunday.

McDonald told police he set to the home of Harrison Jackson, 67, a school bus driver.

Then, while the man searched the ruins of his home, McDonald shot him in the back with a .22 calibre rifle. Jackson died in an Asheville hospital Monday.

McDonald was a regular rider on the school bus driven by Jackson. But Swain county Sheriff Paul Crisp said the youngster gave no reason for the arson or the shooting.
