WOMAN To WOMAN

Speaking of inaugurations, a North Carolina born First Lady, Mrs. Dorothea (Dolley) Payne Madison, wife of James Madison, 4th president of the United States, presided at the first inaugural ball in 1809. She was born May 12, 1768, daughter of John Payne, a Virginia Quaker, who freed his slaves.

According to biographers, she sent the first personal message over S. F. B. Morse's telegraph wire, rescued the Gilbert Stuart portrait of Washington from the White House when the British came August 24, 1814, and helped edit Madison's highly important records of the Constitutional Convention.

North Carolina-born presidents of the United States include President James Knox Polk, 11th president, born in Mecklenburg County November 2, 1795 and inaugurated in 1845, and President Andrew Johnson, 17th president, born in

Raleigh, December 29, 1808 and inaugurated in 1865. North Carolinians have also served in the presidents' Cabinets. In 1947 Kenneth C. Royal served as Secretary of War. Previously serving as Secretary of the Navy from North Carolina were George E. Badger (1841), William A. Graham (1850), James C. Dobbins (1853), and Joseph Daniels (1913).

Six presidents, including George Washington and Thomas Jefferson, married widows. James Buchanan, inaugurated at the age of 65 remained a bachelor for his entire life.

Let's hope for a pleasant Inaugural Day this year. The drum majorettes and "queens" who caught pneumonia last time were not the only casualties of such occasion. President William Henry Harrison caught pneumonia during his inauguration in 1841 and died 31 days later, never having fully recovered.

Jewish Leader Urges Program to Better Negro-Jewish Relationships

PHILADELPHIA, — A national Jewish leader called tonight for "free and candid discussions" as part of a program to improve relations between Negroes and Jews. He warned that conflict between the two groups "serves only the cause of the segregationists."

Nathan L. Edelstein of Philadelphia, chairman of the national Governing Council of the American Jewish Congress, said that despite some disturbing signs there is no reason to believe that anti-Semitism has effected more than a small part of the total Negro community.

man of the Philadelphia Commission on Human Relations, noted that although influential Negro leaders have publicly urged the contribution of Jewish organizations in the fight for racial equality, "the mass of the Negro community is yet unaware of the contribution."
