Winston-Salem Tops A&T In Thrilling Overtime Contest, 81-79

GREENSBORO. — The A and T College Aggies last Saturday night lost a basketball game to Winston-Salem Teachers College Rams, 81-79, after time had expired in a thriller at the Greensboro War Memorial Coliseum.

With the score deadlocked, 79-all, as regulation time ended, Tommy Monteiro Ram center stepped up to the foul line with a one and one situation and sank both of them. The first was enough.

Ironically it was the same Monteiro who turned a similar flick on the same floor in the Winston win last year over the Aggies, the defeat which knocked A and T out of the CIAA championship. He sank the winning field goal in that scrap as the buzzer went off.

The Aggies had possession of the ball with 53 seconds as the game was tied and chose to go for the final shot. Head coach Cal Irvin had called timeout to plan the winning play. Jerry Powell, Henry "Hank" Marshall and Herb Gray consumed 40 of those crucial seconds in passes in the outer court. Gray took the pass with five seconds left and drove in for a layup, which fell harmlessly off the rim. On the foul, he was cited with a charging foul as the buzzer blasted.

A and T, again dominated the play in the first half and had gone ahead by as much as nine points, 37-28, the biggest edge in the game with three minutes left in the first period. By intermission time, the Winston club had whittled that lead to 40-37.

Winston came storming back in the second half and scored three straight field goals before a cold bunch of Aggies could get started. From then on, A and T was chiefly in the catchup role. In the fateful second half the score was tied six times, at 45-all, 58-all, 67-all, 76-all, 78-all and that crucial, 79-all deadlock.

Cleo Hill, the Winston-scoring sensation, with 24-points led the scoring for both teams. Three other Rams hit in double figures, including Willie Curry, 13, Rich-

ard Glover, 16 and Monteiro with 11.

Wylie Briggs, a freshman forward, a substitute for big Bob Keller, sidelined with a leg injury, led Aggie scoring with 14-points. Other Aggies hitting in double figures included: Walt Holtzclaw, with 13 and Marshall and Gray with 11 each.

The loss left A and T with a 6-2 average, while the win gave the Rams a 6-1 season's record.

Albany Gridders Honor Coach

ALBANY, Ga. — Albany State College championship football team of 1960, honored Head Coach Obie W. O'Neal, Jr., Friday, Jan. 20, before he departed for Indiana University where he will do additional study toward the Doctorate.

Coach O'Neal, who guided his charges to an undefeated and unsurpassed season, was presented a watch by Art Gamble, co-captain elect, junior from Quitman.

The Rams shut out seven foes and played two scoreless ties, becoming the first college football team since 1939 to turn the trick, and the first team in Negro Sports history to achieve that unique distinction.

Johnson Quits Athletics For Movie Career

COLUMBUS, Ohio. — Rafer Johnson, Olympic decathlon champion and often acclaimed the world's best athlete, announced Saturday night he was quitting athletics for a crack at a movie career.

Johnson made this announcement following his receipt of the John E. Sullivan trophy, as the nation's outstanding amateur athlete.

The award was made at the Columbus Touchdown Club banquet Saturday night.

Danville Businessman Trys Entering Team in the Carolina League

Prospects of the entry in the Carolina league of a team integrated from the batboy on up to the top echelons of management appeared dim.

Directors of the league, in a meeting in Durham Sunday, heard a proposal from a Danville Negro businessman to sponsor a team for the league but took no action on it.

The proposal came from James W. Peters, undertaker in Danville.

At the same time, the league shunted aside applications from High Point-Thomasville and Lynchburg, Va.

For all practical purposes, the league's player personnel has been integrated for some years now.

Major league teams with affiliations in the Carolina league began assigning Negro players to their clubs in the mid fifties, and the practice has continued.

However, there is no instance of an integrated management among the teams of the league.

The Carolina League has teams in Durham, Raleigh, Greensboro, Winston-Salem, Burlington and Wilson.

Danville has been a member of the league, but dropped out in recent years because of financial

difficulties.

The Carolina League holds a class B rating.

Johnson Paces Tenn. State Cage Team

NASHVILLE. — Homegrown hardwood ace, Rossie "Shotgun" Johnson, took over Tennessee State University's leading scorer's slot with 11 more games to play.

Riding crest of the nation's college cage crews for the fifth straight week, Coach Harold Hunter's Gunners dropped their opening tilt and bounced back to string 14 wins in a row. Now the Nashville cat burners must protect their win streak on the road for their next eight games.

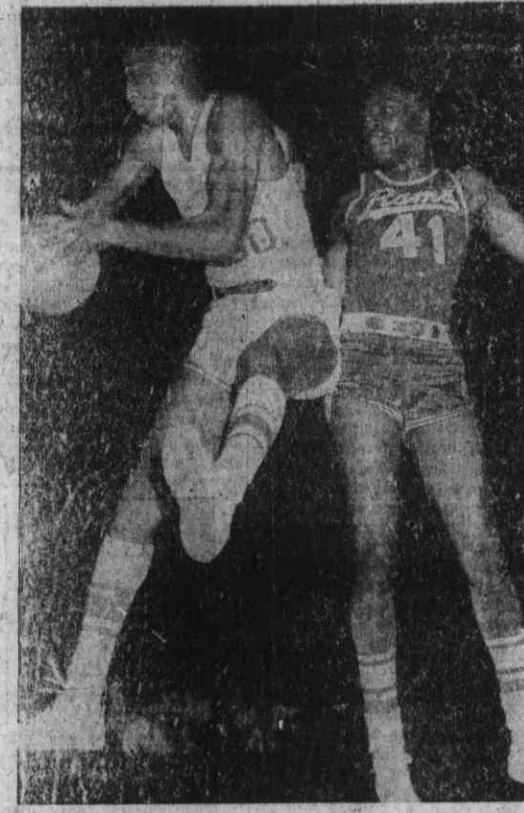
Hunter's Gunners were scheduled to get a flint-and-steel testing against St. Francis (Pa.) Jan. 24; Southern Illinois Jan. 31; and St. Bonaventure on Feb. 8. However, the jet-assisted Big Blue twine-burners can not overlook conference foes Central State (O.) Jan. 21 and Kentucky State Feb. 10.

Gannon College on Jan. 25, Eastern Illinois Jan. 28, and Georgetown (Ky) Feb. 10 completes the Tennessee State's road swing.

Johnson, 6-4 senior from Gallitau, has 109 field goals and 41 free throws for 15 games gave him a four point hold on scoring honors. Porter Meriwether has 255 points for only 14 games.

Averaging 9.4 rebounds per game, Johnson is paced in this department by Tennessee State's human skyscraper George Finley, a 7-1 pivotman from Chattanooga, and forward Mel Davis who are both averaging a shade over 10 erring bounces per game.

Clinic To Be Held On Injuries At NCC Feb. 1

A one day clinic on treatment of athletic injuries will be held at North Carolina College on Saturday, Feb. 11.

Announcement of the clinic was made this week by Dr. Leroy T. Walker, professor of Physical Education North Carolina College and track coach.

Walker will serve as director for the clinic.

The clinic will open at nine a. m. Saturday morning and close at five. All sessions will be held in the R. L. McDougald (men's) gymnasium on Lawson street.

Walker said outstanding trainers from colleges and schools in this area will serve as instructors.

The clinic is open to all interested persons. There will be no charge for attendance at the sessions.

In a statement issued this week, the clinic's director, Walker, said "knowledge of what to do in an emergency is a necessity for most people in athletics today.

"Although we have been relatively fortunate in North Carolina insofar as the number of fatal injuries occurring during athletic contests and practices, the high degree of organization, the increasing complexity and the sheer speed of today's athletic games make the possibility of injury greater.

"Certainly anyone connected with athletics should know what to do when injuries occur.

"A great deal of the misery and suffering endured by athletes and the time and money lost by institutions could be recovered if there were enough people who know how to act in emergency situations."

"The clinic hopes to be able to prepare these people to act quickly and intelligently when injuries occur."

S. C. Extends SIAC Winning Streak to Nine

ORANGEBURG, S. C. — The South Carolina State College Bulldogs have now won nine straight games to take the SIAC lead with a 7-1 record and an overall picture of 12-2.

State smashed Clark 69-64 on Monday and walloped the defending champions Morris Brown 111-87 on Wednesday as the two small backcourt men Ernest (Sonny) Jackson 6' 1" and William Morgan 5' 11" sparked the attack.

Ex-Giant Farmhand Looking To Resuming Career After Service

FT. McPHERSON, Ga. — Pfc. James McClain, former member of the San Francisco Giants farm system, is looking forward to his separation from the Armed services in February to resume his career in baseball.

McClain, who entered the service at Fort Jackson in Oct., 1959, is a unit clerk here for Headquarters Company Training Command.

During the baseball season, he led the Fort McPherson Colonels in every offensive department but one. He tied for the lead in that one.

He posted the best average, at .357; led in runs batted in, with 57; in stolen bases, with 29 and 34 for the home run lead with ten.

The Colonels played a scheduled of 58 games.

Before his entry into the Army,

McClain was property of the San Francisco Giants.

He signed a contract with the Giants as an outfielder short after graduating from high school in Laurinburg in 1957.

Before signing with the Giants he played three years in semi-professional baseball as a member of the Durham Rams.

Once in the Giants organization he was assigned the first year, an all rookie league at Hastings, Nebraska. Prior to his induction he played centerfield for the Giants AA farm club in the Texas League.

McClain was an all around athlete in high school, showing brilliance in football, basketball and track.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe McClain, Sr., of 1210 Hazel street in Durham, N. C.

Walker Publishes Article, Lists Appearance

The current issue of the *Journal of Health, Physical Education and Recreation* carries an article titled "On the Field of Friendly Strife" by Dr. L. T. Walker, professor of physical education and track coach at North Carolina College at Durham.

Walker's article in the *Journal of Health, Physical Education and Recreation* concerns his experiences as a track coach representing the U. S. Department of State at the Olympic Games in Rome, Italy, last summer. The upcoming piece in *Scholastic Coach* deal with the track coach's perennial problem teaching sprinters to "leave the blocks" on time.
