Durhamite Gets Ph.D. From New York U.

Thomas Howard Shaw, formerly of Durham, received the Doctor of Philosophy degree in Psychology from New York University during the October 1960 Convocation. The title of Dr. Shaw's dissertation was "Frustration and Anxiety—A Study of Differences Between Frustration and Anxiety Drive Properties in Selective Learning."

Dr. Shaw is an Associate Professor of Psychology at the New York City Community College, a licensed Psychologist in New York State and a Consulting Psychologist in New York City.

He is a graduate of the local Hillside High School, received the Bachelor of Arts degree from W. Virginia State College and took his Master's degree from Columbia University in New York City. He is an active member of the American Psychological Association, the New York State Psychological Association, the Society for Clinical Psychologists of New York City and the American Personnel and Guidance Association.

He served in the United States Army as a Captain in the Armored Force Artillery during World War II participating in three major campaigns in the European Theater of Operations.

Ex-Durhamite To Return in Concert At NCC March 17

The Beta Zeta Chapter of the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, will present in a song recital, Isador Oglesby, tenor, on Friday, March 17, 1961, at the E. N. Duke Auditorium, at 8:15 p.m.

Oglesby, a native of North Carolina, has been acclaimed for his unusually sensitive singing voice, which has shown outstanding development under competent teachers. His interpretations of the music of his people has been commented upon in recent months.

A graduate of Hillside High School, he taught at both his alma mater and at North Carolina College, prior to taking up residence in Baltimore.

He will be remembered here for his active work in the cultural life of the community and as director of the North Carolina College Male Glee Club.

At the present he is studying with Henry Jacobi, famous European voice specialist, and conducts a private studio himself for promising teen-age singers.

The appearance of Oglesby represents his first recital for his home audience since his outstanding appearance in Baltimore and New York, last fall.
