

Maryland State Cops CIAA Track Crown

PETERSBURG, Va. — (CIAA News Service)—Coach Clifton Anderson's Maryland State College trackmen climaxed a dramatic finish to the 40th annual CIAA track and field championships by winning their first CIAA track title here at Rogers Stadium.

The Hawks gained 36 1/3 points to win the meet ahead of dark-horse N. C. College, the surprise team of the meet. It took a 46-8 hop, step and jump leap by Maryland State's Eddie Bush for the Eastern shore trackmen to overcome NCC's harriers in the very last event of the day. Prior to that the Eagles, of Leroy T. Walker led the 40th annual meet all the way.

Saturday's running presented the most evenly matched CIAA competition that has been displayed in many years. Four teams were in the running for the championship. In addition to Md. State and North Carolina, Morgan State, a pre-meet favorite, and Winston-Salem were considered as strong challengers for team honors.

Three new records were established and another equalled despite a rain soaked surface which had been hit hard by heavy rains the night before. Four men were double winners and four men retained individual titles in the 17 event program.

Russell Rogers led the assault for Maryland State, winning both 120 yard and 220 yard hurdles races. He also placed third in the javelin behind Virginia State's Lucius Shuler's record smashing throw of 205' 1".

Rogers took the 120 yard highs in 14.2, finishing ahead of NCC's Hearn brothers, Dickie and George, and came back to win the 220 yard lows in a record shattering time of 23.2 to erase Fran Washington's old mark of 23.3.

North Carolina College proved the "glamour team" of the meet, upsetting perennial powerful Morgan State in both the sprint medley and mile relays. It marked the first time in more than a dozen years that Morgan had lost both relay titles.

On the strength of Andy McCray's blistering 1:54.1 880 anchor leg in the sprint medley NCC's quartet of Walt Johnson, Joe Goodwater, Billy Merritt and McCray edged Hampton and Morgan State in that order. The Eagles were caught in 3:27.8, followed by Hampton 3:28.3.

In the featured mile relay, Le-

roy T. Walker's foursome of Goodwater, Rod Lennon, McCray, and Johnson scored first place, crossing the tape ahead of Morgan State in 3:15.4. Morgan State finished five yards off the pace in 3:17.1, followed by Hampton's 3:17.2.

The win in this event gave NCC a total of 31 points, all piled up in running events. With only the hop, step and jump event remaining on the card, Maryland trailed by 3/4 points. Bush's win in this event gave the Hawks their first track title in the history of the school and a first for Anderson in his 1st season at the helm of the Maryland State harriers.

Godfrey Moore, Winston-Salem's premier broad jumper, leaped 25-4 on the first day of the meet to win the broad jump event. His leap broke a 7 year old mark held by Wilbur Wilson, formerly of Va. State.

Hewitt Joyner, Delaware State's lithe distance runner, took both the mile and two mile running events.

Olympian Paul Winder of Morgan State kept his team in contention with a double win in the sprint races. Winder flashed across the finish line 9.6 in the century race ahead of Maryland's Dan Miller and NCC's Billy Merritt. In the 220 race he zipped off a 20.7 to tie the meet record held by Vance Robinson, finishing ahead of Howard's Clyde Glasgow, Hampton's Robert Johnson, and NCC's Joe Goodwater, all clocked under 21 seconds.

Al Santio, the big Providence, R. I. sophomore, added first for Maryland State in the shot put and the discus. He tossed the shot 47.7 1/2 and the discus 165-8 1/4.

In the 440 yard dash, NCC's Walt Johnson retained his 440 yard crown by outdistancing Hampton's Joe Pullum and Winston-Salem's Fraskie Bowns to the finish line. Johnson stepped off a 48.2 despite the heavy conditions of the track.
