crimination. The executive order is one means through which the Presi dent can deal with the issue with out going to Congress.

The President has been urged by

several groups throughout the country to take such a step. It has been pointed out that the govern ment, through its influence on the housing industry, is the biggest promoter of segregated ghettoes In addition the difficulty faced by African and dark-skinned envoys in this country is securing housing has caused considerable embarass

If such an order is issued, it would have far reaching effect on the housing industry. Virtually most of the nation's private and public housing involves governnent. Practically all of the mul iple unit dwellings built in the past several years have been con-structed with the aid of direct federal loans.

A majority of the private home crected are financed through feder-illy guaranteed loans through the federal Housing Administration of hrough loans guaranteed by the Veterans Administration.
