In Memory of Mrs. J. N. Carter

A Book of Remembrance has been dedicated to the memory of the late Mrs. Jennie Nance Carter at Bethel A. M. E. Church, Greenwich, Conn.

Mrs. Carter, the former Jennie Amanda Nance, was born February 8, 1888 at Newberry, S. C., the daughter of Emanuel and Amanda Nance. Her childhood was spent in Spartanburg, S. C. She attended Claffin College and Biddle University at which she taught in S. C. nine years.

She was married in 1909 to the late Rev. William Henry Carter of Oxford. To this union four children were born, William Nance, Benjamin Carter, Jennie Alberta and Richard Samuel Carter. She became a widow in 1919. She then taught for thirty-two years in North Carolina. Retiring in 1951, Mrs. Carter lived a wholesome and happy life with her son William and family in Greenwich. Her remaining children, grandchildren, and great grandchildren now reside in New York.

Following the laying in state of her body at Scarborough and Hargett Chapel in Durham, March 17-18, 1961, interment was beside her husband in Maplewood Cemetery, Greensboro.

The Book of Remembrance is on display in the vestibule of Bethel A. M. E. Church in Greenwich. The pastor, Rev. C. R. Barrow appointed a committee to obtain funds for scholarships to A. M. E. schools for students pursuing religious education. The committee consists of Mrs. Thomas Nelson, William Blakley, Charles Hart, Cyril Brooks and William Carter. 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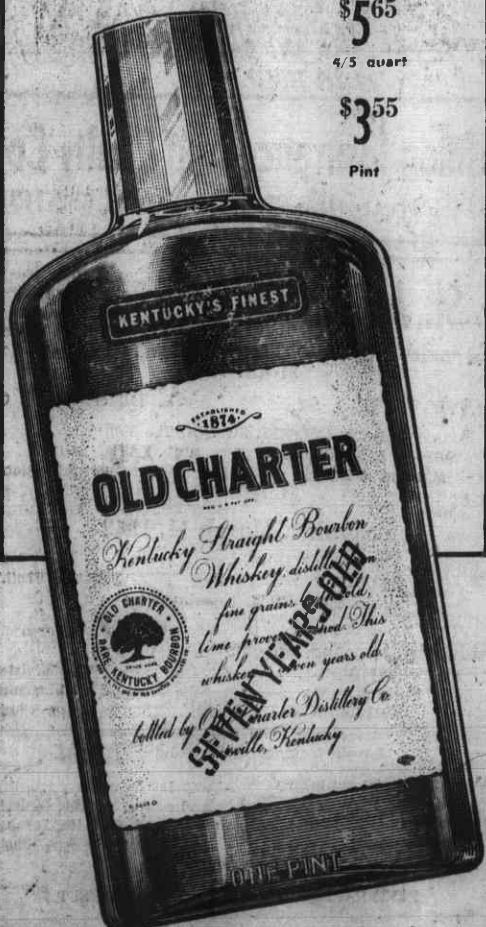
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
