

# NCC to Hold Science Institute

High school juniors and seniors interested in biology, chemistry, and mathematics may attend North Carolina College next summer for six weeks on an all-expense-paid scholarship. The announcement was made recently by President Alfonso Eider and Dr. James S. Lee, chairman of the department of biology, who will direct the college's fourth annual summer institute for high school students.

Dr. Lee, prominent as researcher and teacher, is currently on the visiting lecture team of the American Institute of the Biological Sciences. The institute is being financed by a \$20,000 grant from the National Science Foundation, the largest of four awards to NCC from NSF in successive years. The dates are June 11 to July 28.

For the first time, according to Dr. Lee, students may attend the institute at no cost to themselves. They will have all fees and expenses, except travel expenses, paid by grant from the college. Travel allowances will be made in exceptionally needy cases, Dr. Lee said.

Approximately 60 students will be admitted to the program. These will be equally divided among those with special skills in biology, chemistry, and mathematics.

The major objectives of the program, the NCC biologist said, "to stimulate the scientific interest and enthusiasm of talented high school juniors and seniors, and to give them broad training in fundamental con-

cepts of the basic sciences of biology, chemistry, and mathematics. "The program will afford these students an opportunity to express their creative abilities and to seek, under the guidance of experienced scientists, solutions to minor problems in science which may interest them," Dr. Lee continued.

The Talley Beatty Dance Troupe of New York City will appear in a dance concert at Hillside High School next Wednesday night, March 14, at 8:00 p.m.

The program, sponsored by Pi Chapter of Chi Eta Phi Sorority (nursing society) is being brought to Durham in an attempt to aid the sorority's campaign.

Beatty, one time principal dancer with the famous Durham Dance Company, of Chicago, has just completed a successful engagement, along with his troupe, on New York's famed Broadway, the showplace of the world.

Folk dances, modern jazz, primitive dance numbers, and frenetic mimes, are scheduled to be used during the program which will feature music composed by some of America's top musical stars.

In addition to Beatty, other dancers slated to appear with the troupe include Candance Caldwell, Altovine Gore, Joan Peters, Jerome Jeffries, Herman Howell and Raymond Gilbert.

Some of the numbers scheduled to be danced on the programs include: "Come and Get the Beauty of It Hot," which includes Beatty and the entire company.

# Negro Publishers At NCC Program

North Carolina College celebrates National Negro Newspaper Week March 11-17 with the appearance of two noted journalists highlighting the observance.

Louis E. Austin, publisher of The Carolina Times of Durham, and Thomas W. Young, president of the Journal and Guide Company of Norfolk, Va., will be guest panelists in a discussion of "The Negro Press." It will be open to the public.

According to Dr. J. H. Taylor, chairman of the NCC Forum Committee, the distinguished journalists will consider "the accomplishments, problems, and challenges of the Negro press."

Austin has been publisher of The Carolina Times since 1927. He is a graduate of the Joseph V. Brick School of Brick, N. C., and of North Carolina College at Durham. He is active in numerous civic and religious organizations, having been president of the Interdenominational Ushers Association of North Carolina since 1937. In addition to holding offices and membership in numerous other organizations. He is a charter member of the Durham Committee on Negro Affairs and is widely known for his editorial and other campaigns in defense of civil rights.

Young holds degrees in both journalism and law from Ohio State University. He has been

counsel for and general manager of the newspaper since 1938. Young law service as a war correspondent for the Journal and Guide during World War II in North Africa and Sicily. His professional, social, and religious affiliations are extensive. He has been secretary of the Norfolk Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity for 20 years. He is secretary and director of Amalgamated Publisher, Inc., a national advertising representative organization with offices in New York and Chicago. The organization was established by and is cooperatively owned by the major newspapers in the United States.

After winning the Philadelphia Inquirer meet in 3:25.6 in the mile run, Dr. Leory T. Walker, NCC track mentor, expects this crew to post better times outdoors.

# New Movie House Opened In Charlotte

CHARLOTTE — A new motion picture theater, owned by an interracial corporation was opened here recently, it was announced this week. The theater has a panoramic screen. The Beatties Ford Rd. near Johnson C. Smith University, opened for business last month, according to G. W. Logan Sr., president of the Savoy-Charlotte Corp., owners of the theater. The new theater brings to four the number of movie houses operated by this group. Others are the Regal in Durham, the Lincoln in Winston-Salem and the Savoy in Charlotte. Built at a cost of more than \$100,000, the exterior of the theater has a colorful front with cream colored bricks. Its interior is completely carpeted, and is furnished with upholstered seats. It is air conditioned and walls of the theater are decorated with modernistic designs. The theater is operated by the Milton Starr Chain, which operates movie houses in several states.

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
