C-R Report Disputes N. C. Jobs Claim

GREENSBORO - The North Carolina Civil Rights Advisory ued a report on the percentage of Niegroes employed by the state which contradicted one issued earlier by the State Personnel director.

The Civil Rights Committee report said that only about 10.8 percent of the employees in 88 state agencies are Negroes.

The report said the percentage of Negroes employed by the state is "significantly lower" than the percentage of Negroes in the state population.

Only about 10.8 percent of the employees in 88 states agencies are Negroes, the report said, while Negroes constitute approximately 25.4 percent of the total population.
