## Center To Train Menal Patients

Plans for operating a vocational rehabilitation center in the Cherry Hospital at Goldsboro, to train mental patients in vocational skills that will help them find jobs upon their release, were revealed at a meeting of the State Board of Education Thursday.

Charles Warren, director of the division of vocational rehabilitation of the State Department of Public Instruction, said a similar program is in its third year of operation at the Caswell Training School at Kinston.

At its meeting, the Board of

Education approved budget changes calling for \$222,720 for renovation of the O'Berry building at the Goldsboro hospital to provide quarters for the vocational rehabilitation program there.

Warren said he hoped to have the program at Goldsboro underway by next spring, starting with only a few patients at first and building up so that eventually 400 to 500 patients will be taking the training.
