## Durham County Schools System Picked to Vie for Library Honors

The Durham County school system has been selected as one of 10 finalist in a nationwide contest to select the best elementary school library program.

Supt. Charles H. Chening was notified of the honor Wednesday, January 9, in a telegram from officials of the two sponsoring organizations, the American Association of School Librarians and Encyclopaedia Britannica, Inc.

Winners will be announced during National Library Week, to be observed April 21-27. Two winners will be picked from among the 10 finalists with each winner to receive \$2,500. Chening paid tribute to the elementary school librarians and principals. "The enthusiastic work is responsible for the honor," he said.

The Durham County schools had no elementary school libraries until six years ago, when one was established to serve two schools.

All the schools now have libraries, which is one of the requirements for accreditation by the Southern Association of College and Schools.

The County school system is accredited by the association.
