ABC Police Stage Raids on 2 Night Clubs

Two Face Judge In Strikes at Goodwill, Valet

Agents of the Durham Alcohol Tax Units and members of the Durham Detective department staged coordinated raids on two Negro night spots which cater to integrated clientele last week-end, resulting in the arrests of two men.

The clubs raided were the Goodwill located on 508 Hope St., and the Valet, on the Apex Highway.

Arrested were U. M. George, operator of the Goodwill Club, and Mack Bunch, operator of the Valet Club. Both were charged with illegal possession and sale of beer and tax raid whisky.

George was released under \$200 bond and Mack under \$300 bond. They were scheduled to stand trial on Friday in Recorder's Court on the charges.

According to ATU police chief A. M. Pollard, the raids were staged by agents of the Alcohol Tax Unit and four detectives from the Durham police department.

Pollard said four ATU men raided the Valet Club at about 7:45 Saturday night and arrested Bunch. At ten p.m., the four ATU men and four city detectives raided the Goodwill Club and arrested George.

The raids were staged at peak business hours at the two clubs, and agents reported a large number of patrons at both places. However, no patrons were arrested.

Pollard said 23 gallons of beer and four and one half gallons of liquor were confiscated at the raids. See **RAID, 6-A**

Twin Standard Of Justice Hit In Lynchburg

LYNCHBURG, Va. — Negroes in Lynchburg, Virginia charged the city with maintaining a double standard of justice in the settlement of two rape cases this week.

An 18-year-old Negro, Thomas C. Wansley, accused of raping a 20-year-old white woman, was sentenced to death by electrocution. At the same time, a 37-year-old white man, Geo. W. Brooks, who was caught by a patrolman while raping an 11-year-old Negro child, was given a five-year sentence from which he can be paroled after serving only 18 months.

Patrolman C. W. Snow testified in Corporation Court that he witnessed Brooks actually attacking the Negro minor.

No witness has been found to testify that Thomas Wansley raped the 20-year-old woman, who could not positively identify him as her attacker.

Although Attorney Reuben Lawson asked for a mental examination for Wansley, Judge Cundiff refused. See **JUSTICE, 6-A**

Charlotte Has 15 Negroes on Commerce Body

CHARLOTTE—A recent survey showed that 15 prominent Negroes hold membership in the Charlotte Chamber of Commerce. They are reported to represent the largest number of Negroes belonging to a Chamber of Commerce in any city in the South.

The first Negroes were admitted to membership here approximately one year ago. The Chamber accepted nine Negroes at that time. About six months later, six more Negroes were accepted.

2 Women Charged as Police Crack What May Be an Abortion Ring

GREENSBORO — Police here believe they may have uncovered the first section of an abortion ring which is operating in North Carolina.

Two women were arrested last week in an investigation which dates back last November. It was revealed this week.

Taken into custody were Mrs. Dorothy Hyde, 42, a practical nurse, of Greensboro and Mrs. Sarah Elizabeth Dillingworth, 42, a beautician of North Thomasville.

Mrs. Hyde was charged with performing an abortion on an unidentified Hertford woman on last Oct. 2. She was released under \$2,500 bond.

The beautician was charged with aiding, abetting and acting as a contact. She was free on \$1,000 bond.

Both women are to be given a hearing in Municipal Court on Feb. 28 here.

Police said the Hyde woman used her home for operations but that no evidence was found of infections or deaths caused through such operations.

Cost of the operations were said to range from \$150 to \$200.

Hospital Plans 150 Units; Cost To Be .75 Million

Lincoln hospital authorities announced Wednesday that it had taken title to ten acres of land between Rosewood street and McDougald Terrace to sponsor 150 units of low rent housing for families displaced by Urban Renewal.

Announcement of the acquisition of the land was made by hospital director Frank Scott. Scott said in a prepared statement that the land was acquired from the Massey estate.

The hospital plans to sponsor a federal financed \$750 thousand housing project consisting of 150 units on the land. Houses will be used to relocate families displaced by Urban Renewal projects.

It was also announced that the entire cost of this project will be financed through a 40 year loan to be insured by the Federal Housing Administration under terms of Section 221-D3 of the National Housing Act as amended. Under this arrangement it will not be necessary for the hospital to use its own funds for financing the project.

Although the exact cost of the project has not been determined, it is estimated that the new development will cost in excess of \$750,000 all of which is eligible for government financing through the Federal National Mortgage Association and the Federal Housing Administration.

Because sponsorship of relocation housing has come to be recognized as one of the determining factors in the success or failure of most urban renewal projects, the United States Congress in 1961 amended the Housing Act of 1949 to provide liberal financing at a minimum rate of interest in instances where non-profit institutions, affected with the public interest, are willing to act as sponsors.

Doctor Clyde Donnell, Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the hospital stated Monday that, "At the suggestion of Durham's Re-development Commission, Trustees of the hospital have taken the position that good housing is a vital part of the health program of every community and on this basis we have agreed to act as a sponsor."

NCC Seeks to Restore Cut of \$1.3 Million

North Carolina College President Alfonso Elder joined representatives of six other state-supported institutions of higher education Tuesday afternoon in Raleigh in presenting budgetary appeals to a joint appropriations committee of the General Assembly.

Requesting the restoration of \$1,333,500 in capital improvement funds for NCC for the 1963-65 biennium, he urged also a supplementary appropriation of \$347,720 for the biennium. This amount included requests for \$288,000 for an addition to the institution's science building and \$69,720 for her in the eye.

IN BUDGET HEARINGS

Legislator Scolds A&T Prexy. for Sit-in Action

RALEIGH — A Warren County legislator scolded the acting President of A. and T. College for the active role A. and T. students have taken in the demonstration against segregation.

The incident occurred as Dr. Louis C. Dowdy, of A. and T. College, appeared before the joint appropriations committee seeking funds for the operation of the state-supported institution.

During a question period in which legislators sought to query Dowdy over various aspects of the college's fund requests, Rep. John Kerr, Jr., of Warrenton asked, "Didn't students from your college take part in the sit-in strikes at Greensboro, trying to do away with segregation?"

"Dr. Dowdy replied, 'yes'. 'And you come down here begging the white folks to give more money to your school... Some of us are getting tired of it' Kerr asserted.

"Dr. Dowdy replied: 'We know that young people in our city, our state and all over the world are seeking for improved behavior patterns. This does not mean that we at A. and T. College are not putting forth every effort to bring about improved behavior patterns on the part of our students.'

Rep. Kerr is a veteran member of the N. C. Legislature. He represents Warren County whose population, according to the latest survey, is composed of 80 per cent Negroes.

Warren is one of several North Carolina counties on the northeastern tier of the state in which the population is predominantly Negro.

Dr. Dowdy, a former dean at A. and T. College, has been acting president since 1961 in the absence of Dr. Samuel D. Proctor who is on leave in an assignment with the Peace Corps.

NCC President Is Praised By N. C. Lawmakers

North Carolina College President Alfonso Elder received a tribute from a North Carolina legislator and applause from members of the General Assembly's Joint Appropriations Committee at a meeting of the Committee in Raleigh Tuesday afternoon.

Appearing before the committee with administrators from six other state supported colleges, Elder presented a request for \$1,333,500 in capital improvement funds and a supplementary appropriation of \$347,720 for services and improvements at the Durham institution.

Citing an occasion when former University of North Carolina President Gordon Gray informed the Joint Appropriations Committee that he would return to the committee repeatedly with requests for funds, Elder said: "I am able, however, to make you a promise that I will not be back in two years asking for an increase. Escapee Dressed Like Woman on Nightly Jaunts

John Wesley Buchanan, 30 year old Durham resident of 2501 Fayetteville St., identified as the "Peeping Tom-Prowler and female impersonator who had terrorized the Hillside High School neighborhood, drew an eight to ten year sentence in Superior Court here late this week.

Buchanan pleaded guilty to five counts of larceny and store breaking. Sentence was imposed by Judge Jay Carr.

Buchanan was arrested last Thursday by veteran detective Frank McCrae who testified at the trial that he found the man hiding under a bed in a complete outfit of women's clothing.

McCrae reported that last week after Buchanan's arrest that the man had admitted to throwing a seat into the Hillside High School neighborhood for the past several weeks as a "peeping tom", prowler, and female impersonator.

Residents of the area had complained repeatedly to police about the prowler, whom they described as resembling a woman.

McCrae explained that Buchanan dressed like a woman during his nocturnal peeping tom and prowling escapades.

The policeman said Buchanan's female outfit was complete, down to silk hose, lace panties and a brassiere.

He said Buchanan used small balloons to support the brassiere. Buchanan was actually spotted with a box of food in the North Carolina College dining hall last week. His discovery by campus police led to his arrest on Thursday.

AFTER LUNCH COUNTER SUCCESSES

Rally on Sunday Seeks to Mobilize Oxford Behind Integration Efforts

OXFORD — A mass meeting at the First Baptist Church here Sunday afternoon will seek to mobilize Negro citizens behind an integration movement and chart a course for further action in the issue in this area.

Officers of the state youth NAACP revealed plans for the meeting this week.

Attorney Floyd McKissick, of Durham, chairman of the Youth Work Committee for the North Carolina NAACP and a veteran civil rights battler, will be the main speaker for the meeting.

Sunday's meeting is planned to mobilize support of the community behind further action on the integration front as a follow up to recent successes in integrating several lunch counters here.

The youth NAACP and Granville Citizens League recently announced integration of five drug stores and one variety store lunch counters here. Opening of the counters was the result of months long negotiations by the Granville County Citizens League, the youth NAACP and store owners.

Speakers for the youth NAACP said Sunday's meeting would re-

port on recent progress toward ending segregation and plans for future action would be made at the meeting.

L. H. McDonald, Secretary for the State Youth NAACP, explained that the meeting would seek to inform citizens of the area of "what we've been trying to do and what we have accomplished in the past."

"We have to inform the public as to the meaning and extent of his movement," he declared. McDonald said that the people need to know, for instance, that several firms in this area have indicated a willingness to hire Negroes in non-traditional and skilled capacities.

"We've got to educate the public on these issues," he said. Five other key figures in the integration movement, besides McKissick, are scheduled to participate in the meeting. McDonald listed them as Ralph Hunt, president of the Granville Citizens League, Guyanna Horton, president of the State Youth NAACP, Rev. L. H. Wade, pastor of First Baptist, of Oxford, and himself.
