First Baptist To Honor Its Pastor

First Calvary Baptist Church will honor its Pastor Reverend A. L. Thompson on his ninth Anniversary Sunday evening, July 28, at 7:30.

FARM SAFETY WEEK

Each year 20 million people suffer from home accidents. Most of these are children under five. More are farm people than city folks. And more often women than men.

In all, accidents in and around the home account for 45 percent of those requiring medical attention or causing persons to restrict their activities for at least a day.

According to the Public Health Service, whose surveys turned up these statistics, falls account for a third of all home accidents. Injuries from moving objects are responsible for another 8 per cent.

Among injuries that boost the total for rural people are those due to handling or stepping on rough objects, cutting or piercing instruments, and animals or insects.

Threats Made Against School

KNOXVILLE, Tennessee — Threats and harassment against Highlander Research and Education Center, Knoxville, Tennessee are continuing. Myles Horton director, said this week.

He reported that windows were broken out on July 16 and that there have been threats of burning the Center at 1625 Riverside Drive.

The Center is a continuation of Highlander Folk School, formerly of Monteagle, Tennessee, where many Negro leaders of the integration movement have been trained.

There have already been three serious instances since June 20 of violence against Highlander personnel and its integrated Smoky Mountain North South Workcamp.

Most recent of these acts was the beating of Myles Horton on the night of July 3 as he and Mrs. Horton, together with Attorney and Mrs. Edward Lynch of Maryville, were in a Maryville restaurant, Blount County, of which Maryville is the county seat. It is a center for the Ku Klux Klan in the upper south.

The restaurant owner, without provocation or warning, attacked Horton, inflicting upon him a laceration to one eye which required three stitches to suture, and other bruises. The host then administered a blow to the right eye of the Maryville lawyer.

Mrs. Horton ran for a policeman, but the policeman, himself a Klan member, refused to come, forcefully expressing his own distaste for Myles Horton's integration activities.

Fund Organized For Evers Kids

CHICAGO — At its meeting here during the annual convention of the NAACP, the Board of Directors authorized the necessary legal papers to be drawn and steps to be taken to provide that the fund collected for the children of the late Medgar Evers be used "for the support and education" of them and not merely for a "college education" as had been temporarily announced at the time Mr. Evers was murdered.

The fund now is in excess of \$30,000 and is expected to reach \$80,000. The principal and the interest will enable the widow to draw funds needed for the care and education of her three children during the years prior to the age for their entrance to college.
