

Dr. Anne Heath, Mrs. Polk Named to AME Posts

ST. LOUIS — Dr. Anne Heath, president of the senior branch of the Women's Missionary Society and Mrs. Anna Polk, director of the Young People's Department, were both unanimously re-elected to head their respective departments at the WMS 34th Quadrennial Convention which closed its 4-day session today.

Contests for 2nd Vice-Pres, Editor of the Women's Missionary Magazine and the Director of Worship were won by Mrs. Frances Jackson of Dallas, Texas and Mrs. A. B. Williams of Jacksonville, Fla. both incumbents, for 2nd Vice-Pres and Editor, respectively. Rev. Eleanor J. Woodcock, dean of students and Professor of Religious Education, Morris Brown College, became the new Worship Leader. Rev. Martha J. Keys, Louisville, Ky. held the position formerly.

Miss Bettye Hardeman, Daytona Beach, Fla., is the newly elected president of the youth division, succeeding Harold Huggins of Jackson, Mississippi.

Mrs. Heath, Washington, D. C. and Mrs. Polk, Pittsburg, Ill. have served since the northern and southern branches of the AME Missionary auxiliary merged in 1951.

Over 4000 women, and 500 youth attended the sessions and workshops which were held for the first time in a non-church building, St. Louis' air-conditioned Kiel Auditorium Opera House. Host church for the convention was St. Paul AME, Hamilton and Julian Avenues, Rev. Dr. G. Wayman Blakely, pastor.

National Council Leaders Attended. Representatives from the National Council of Churches serving as consultants and speakers were Dr. John L. Regier, Executive Secretary, Division of Home Missions who recently assisted in organizing the amusement park demonstrations in Baltimore. Dr. Regier cautioned that Negro churches, purchasing pro-

erty in changing neighborhoods ought to integrate "whites". He further challenged the AME Church to elect white Bishops and use more white ministers.

Mrs. W. Murdoch MacLeod, General Director, United Church Women, in addition to praising the leadership of Mrs. Anne Heath, with whom she works in the National Council, challenged the women to "pioneer in the field of peace, nation building and development and in civil rights."

Dr. Malcolm Blackburn, Director Dept of Stewardship and Finance, NCC, headed the judges of the Scrap Book Contest on Asia. First place went to the 1st Episcopal District, with Mrs. Elvira Baber, Philadelphia, supervisor receiving the silver bow.

Mrs. Mildred S. Sherrod, congressional office of the CME Women's Missionary represented her group with fraternal greetings as did Mrs. Frankie M. Freeman, for the National Council of Negro Women.

On recommendation of the Christian Social Relations Committee, headed by Mrs. Bessie W. Pogue, New Orleans, unanimous endorsement was given for a nation-wide vote registration drive that asks every AME woman to become a registered voter. Each of 5,000 missionary societies in the U. S. is to maintain a registry of registrators obtained and report to the national office in Washington.
