## State Legislature Appropriates Over \$3 Million for FSTC

**FAYETTEVILLE**—Dr. Rudolph Jones, President of Fayetteville State College, announced that the State Legislature appropriated \$3,052,500 for the college's building and renovation program.

This figure is exclusive of the self-liquidation features involved in certain buildings.

Eight projects were approved by the Advisory Budget Commission:

1. Classroom building, total cost, \$385,000. This facility will replace Aycock Building and will provide space for music, art, and the social sciences.
2. Campus drainage and widen main drive, total cost, \$90,000. The campus drainage project will provide culverts, catch basins, etc. for the stream running through the center of the campus. The main drive to the campus will be changed from its present position.
3. Redecorate president's house, total cost, \$5,000.
4. Library, total cost, \$400,000. This will provide a modern two-story structure to replace the existing building.
5. Dormitory for 200 women, total cost, \$550,000. \$275,000 of this amount is self-liquidating. This dormitory will replace Bickett Hall.
6. Dormitory for 250 men, total cost, \$687,500. \$343,500 of this amount is self-liquidating.

7. Physical education building for women, total cost \$470,000. \$235,000 of this amount is self-liquidating. This building will provide physical education facilities for women plus a swimming pool to be used by both men and women students.

8. Student center, total cost \$460,000. \$230,000 of this amount will be self-liquidating. This building will provide a central space for student activities, lounges, and related facilities.

## New Building

**GREENSBORO**—Construction on the new \$475,000 health and physical education building at Bennett College is progressing rapidly.

General contractor for the two-story brick structure, located at the southwest corner of Bennett and Gorrell streets, is the H. L. Coble Construction Company. Ground was broken in June and the building should be completed within the next eight months.

Most of the concrete footings have been poured and construction of the brick walls has begun. Structural steel work is expected to begin within two months.

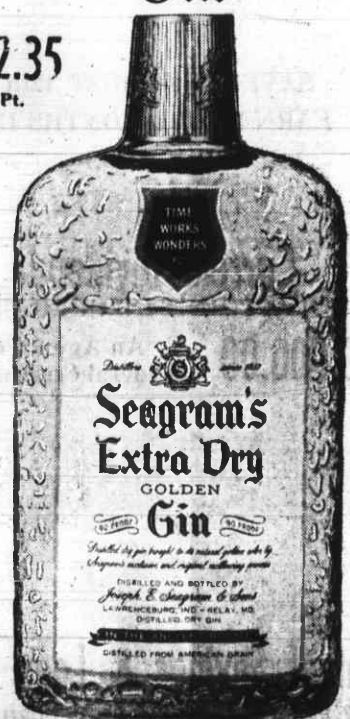
The McClure Fund, which will award scholarships for attendance at 20 North Carolina colleges and junior colleges, has in progress of applications for additional scholars.
