### Bennett College Orientation Week To Feature Parents' Meeting

GREENSBORO — A feature of Freshman Orientation Week at Bennett College, September 12-19, will be the parents' meeting scheduled for September 12. President Willa B. Player will preside at the opening session to be held at 10:15 a. m. in the Science Assembly and Mrs. David D. Jones, director of admissions, will give a description summary of the entering class. This will be followed by a discussion of "The Freshman Curriculum" with the following core chairman participating: Dr. George Breathitt, social science; Miss George Latimer, English and reading; Dr. Roy Lee, general science; Mrs. Louise G. Street, home and family life education, and Dr. E. Doris McKinney physical education. This discussion will be followed by "How Can Parents Help?" is a question period. The topic to be presented by Dr. Francis I. Grandstaff, director of psychological services, after which there will also be a question period. The parents will be guests at 12:30 p.m. at a luncheon to be presided over by Dr. Grandstaff. C. Winton, chairman of the academic standards committee, at which time President Player will speak and introduce persons in key faculty and administrative posts, as well as student leaders. Entering students were sent, early this summer, a selected list of five books to be read and asked to do some reflective thinking in connection with them before coming to the campus. During their orientation period they will be asked to participate in faculty-led discussions based upon the books. While time and attention will

be given to some of the usual activities of freshman orientation, such as campus tour, introduction to campus rules and regulations and the usual battery of tests, it was felt that more emphasis should be placed upon providing an intellectual experience in an academic setting which would challenge the student and give her a glimpse of what she as the potential to create and become.
