Here's a dessert to top your "good the year round" list. It's Southern Sponge Roll, a tender golden sponge cake rolled around your favorite fruit and whipped cream filling.

SOUTHERN SPONGE ROLL

1 egg, separated
1/2 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla

1 cup sifted enriched soft-rising flour
Confectioners' sugar
Whipped Cream Filling

Beat egg yolks until thick and lemon-colored (4 minutes at high speed on electric mixer). Gradually beat in 1/2 cup sugar. Stir in vanilla. Beat egg whites until frothy. Add remaining sugar, 2/3 teaspoon at a time, beating continuously until stiff, but not dry. Peaks form. Fold egg yolk mixture into egg whites. Beat about one cup mixture and fold in gently. Turn into waxed paper-lined 10 1/2 x 15 1/2-inch jelly roll pan and spread evenly. Bake in moderate oven (375°F.) 15 to 18 minutes. Turn out on clean towel dusted with confectioners' sugar. Remove waxed paper. Starting at narrow end, roll up cake and towel together. Cool. Unroll and spread with filling. Re-roll, using towel to guide rolling. Cover with towel and chill. Cut in 1-inch slices to serve. Makes 10 servings.

Whipped Cream Filling: Fold 2 cups sliced fruit and 2 tablespoons confectioners' sugar into 1/2 pint whipped whipping cream.
