## Garfield Named To FHA Training Staff In Atlanta

WASHINGTON, D. C.—Appointment of Alexander D. Galtier, veteran training director and educator, as an Intergroup Relations Specialist for the Atlanta, Georgia, regional office of the Housing and Home Finance Agency (HHFA) was announced this week by Commissioner William L. Slayton of the Urban Renewal Administration.  
As staff adviser to the Regional Director of Urban Renewal, Galtier serves as focal point in the HHFA regional office for advising on minority group considerations arising from urban renewal and related operations in the eight-state region, comprised of Alabama, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Tennessee.  
Native of Knoxville, Tennessee, Galtier received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Knoxville College in 1932 and his Master's degree from Ohio State University, Columbus, in 1938. His educational background also includes courses at the Tennessee State University in Nashville, and the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

## North Carolina College Names Four New Department Heads

Four new department heads in the social sciences will assume responsibilities for their respective areas at North Carolina College effective September 1 in accordance with actions by the college's board of trustees at its meeting last May.  
The appointments were among several chairmanships approved by the board to become effective on different dates. Included were the appointment, effective immediately, of three persons holding temporary chairmanships to permanent positions as department heads and the designation of Dr. F. G. Shipman, professor of education, as chairman of the college's Department of Education effective September 1.  
The four social science chairmen will head newly designated departments which were formerly units of the Division of Social Sciences. They are Dr. Violet Wurfel, the Department of Political Science; Dr. Helen G. Edmonds, the Department of History and Social Science; Dr. Theodore R. Speigner, the Department of Geography; and Dr. Joseph S. Himes, the Department of Sociology.  
Serving last year on a temporary basis, but appointed permanently as departmental chairmen effective in May, were Dr. Charles A. Ray, English; Dr. Allen E. Weatherford, Physical Education and Recreation; and Dr. James F. Tucker, Commerce.

## USDA to Feature 4-H'ers at Negro Progress Exhibit

WASHINGTON, D. C.—A score of Chicago 4-H youth representing the city's 1,600 members will present a series of demonstrations as a feature of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's exhibit at the Century of Negro Progress Exposition in Chicago at McCormick Place, Aug. 16-Sept. 2.  
The Department's exhibit—a suite to the Negro farmer—will combine 4-H food, crafts, and clothing demonstrations with a pictorial display of the modern Negro farmer and his contribution to American agriculture and to reasonably priced food and fiber for city consumers.  
In a welcome statement in a leaflet to be distributed at the exhibit, Secretary Orville I. Freeman, now abroad, says: "The U. S. Department of Agriculture is proud of the Negro farmer's achievements and of its own part in providing him and others with practical assistance."  
Among those to be shown on the pictorial panels are: Dr. George Washington Carver, who designed in 1906 the first farm demonstration van; T. M. Campbell, first farm demonstration agent, who drove the van all over Alabama helping farmers improve their methods; and Eristus Sams, outstanding hybrid corn breeder of Waller, Texas.

## Fisher Memorial To Honor Pastor, Rev. Lawson

Guests for the occasion will be leading ministers of the city, choir and congregation of the various churches.  
Services will begin promptly each night at 8:00. Officers of various departments of the church will lead in the devotional services nightly.  
Dr. N. Midgette, pastor of Penecostal United Holy Church, Goldsboro, will deliver the anniversary message on Sunday, September 1, at 3:00 p. m.  
Bishop Lawson served as assistant pastor of the church for a number of years along with the late Bishop H. C. Fisher. The church was originally Gospel Tabernacle. After the death of Bishop Fisher, Rev. Lawson became pastor.  
In 1958 the new and beautiful edifice with five large classrooms; a business office, Sunday School auditorium, Fellowship Hall, and kitchen along with other modern facilities were completed.  
The new church was named Fisher Memorial United Holy Church in honor of its former pastor, Bishop Fisher.  
Since the beginning of Rev. Lawson's pastorate, the membership has grown tremendously. Also many new features have been added to the church calendar. The church has also witnessed steady growth both spiritually and financially.  
Rev. Lawson received his early education at Harris Hill School Roxboro, Douglass Elementary School, Baltimore, Md., and Boylston, Va. He graduated from Hillside High School and received his A. B. degree at Livingstone College, Salisbury, and B. D. degree at Shaw University, Raleigh. A. D. D. degree at Bible Training Institute, Goldsboro. He was chosen and consecrated Bishop of the Youth Department of the United Holy Church of America, Inc.  
He is a member of the Durham Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance and the NAACP presently, he is pastor of the Jerusalem United Holy Church of Reidsville, president and teacher of the Bible Training Institute of Goldsboro of which he was dean for a number of years.  
The services will close Sunday September 1 with dinner in the Fellowship Hall of the Church.

## NCC Bands to Perform for Giants

New York Giant Football Club officials announced this week that North Carolina College's 120 piece marching band will provide the halftime entertainment at their home game Sunday, December 8.  
It will be the second appearance for the NCC aggregation in the Gotham City. In their last appearance in 1961, more than 10,000 fans demanded an encore of music and this lasted for one-half hour. New York's finest had to rescue the band from the crowd so members could catch their buses for downtown New York.  
This will be the band's third appearance at a National League football game. A national television audience and a crowd of 57,000 saw them perform in 1962 at the halftime of the Green Bay Packers, Baltimore Colts game in Baltimore, Maryland.  
NCC's band, directed by R. H. L. Jones, has established itself as one of the nation's finest collegiate marching units.  
Members of the band will return to the campus September 7 to begin preparations for their fall football game appearances and the New York Giants-Washington Redskins game. More than 100 invitations have been extended to old and prospective band members.

## White Sawmill Worker is Found Guilty of Assault on NAACP Leader

RICHMOND, Va.—Frank Guthrie, a white sawmill worker was found guilty of assault on the person of W. Lester Banks, executive secretary of the Virginia State Conference-NAACP, by the Trial Justice Court of Charlotte County, Virginia on August 7.  
At the opening of court the defendant Guthrie entered a plea of guilty.  
After the court had heard testimony from the defendant Guthrie and his accuser, Banks, both the State and the defense rested.  
Upon recommendation by counsel, Guthrie was fined \$25.00. However, Judge Morton observed that in his opinion \$25.00 was unusually heavy that it was customary in such cases to levy fines not in excess of \$10.00.  
Attorney Henry L. Marsh, III, law partner of S. W. Tucker and a member of the Virginia NAACP Legal Staff, served as special prosecutor for the Commonwealth.  
Observers were noted in the integrated courtroom from Charlottesville and four adjoining counties.
