JURY REFUSES TO INDICT SUSPECT IN RACE KILLING

NEW YORK — An Etowah county grand jury refused on September 13, to indict Floyd Simpson for the murder on April 23 of William Moore, Baltimore CORE member, on his one-man Freedom Walk across the south.

Simpson had been arrested two days after the Alabama road side murder following an FBI ballistics test indicating that the bullets in Moore's body came from a gun belonging to Simpson.

Moore had walked past Simpson's grocery store and had reportedly talked to him. Simpson was still in jail when the first group of Freedom Walkers resumed Moore's walk were arrested. On that day he was heard telling other prisoners: "I'd kill
