I can't get it from the Muslims for I cannot be free in a world of many races, if I try to live in some little, artificial I created for myself. I can get it from the NAACP, the SCLC and CORE. I can get it from the Urban League and the Student Non-Violent Coordinating Committee and from white and black people, all united in a crusade for freedom. But they must unite or I will never be free.
