pupils education and made them unprepared to cope even with whites of the South who have had the best schools their section of the country have had to offer.

If graduates of such Negro schools are not able to make the grade when thrown in competition with graduates of white schools we do not think it is fair to place the full responsibility on the Negro teacher or the pupil. Part of it, at least, is due to the damnable segregated educational system of the South which for years has been deliberately and intentionally designed to make it impos-

sible for Negroes to compete with whites in the fields of industry, business, government and elsewhere.

So, we say let the demonstrations continue. Let them continue until every semblance of the segregated pattern of education is abolished from the face of the earth. We say, let every Negro adult support the demonstrations by registering and voting, so that once again it may be proved conclusively that one's race or color has nothing to do with his mental capacity.
