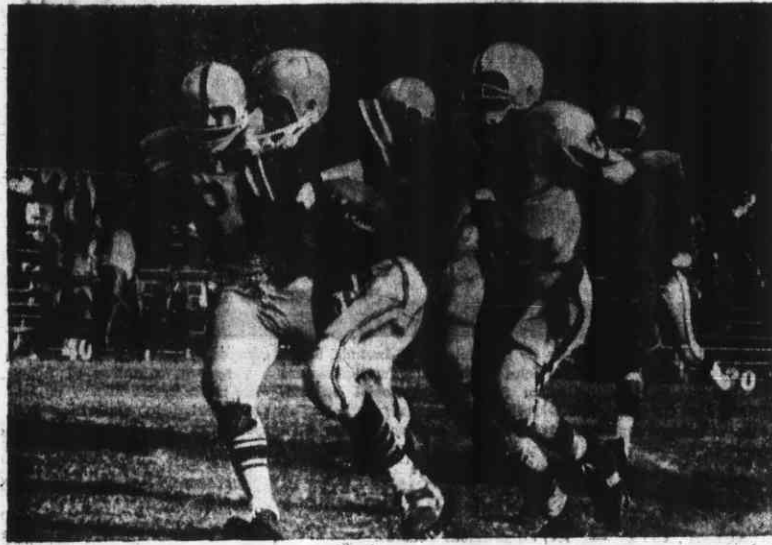


High-Scoring A&T Stirs Hopes of Beating Florida A&M

NCC Edges Va. State, 19-12, In CIAA Scrap

The North Carolina College Eagles remained unbeaten in the Central Intercollegiate Athletic Association by defeating the Virginia State Trojans at O'Kelly Field Saturday 19-12.

It was a critical contest for Herman H. Riddick and his Eagles. Entering the game, both teams were undefeated in the conference. In downing the Trojans the Eagles now hold a 2-0 loop record and are 4-0 overall. The Virginians are 2-1 in the league.

The Eagles had to depend on the engineering of quarterback Aaron Martin to get their offensive moving. Martin threw one touchdown pass and engineered two more for the NCC victory.

The New Bern senior threw a pass to end Aaron Spaulding for the initial NCC score. After a scoreless first quarter, Martin nifted an aerial covering 24 yards to Aaron Spaulding in the opening minutes of the second quarter to give the Eagles a 6-0 advantage. The score was set up after the Virginians had punted on their fourth down deep in their own territory, and the ball landed on their own 24 yard line. The PAT was wide.

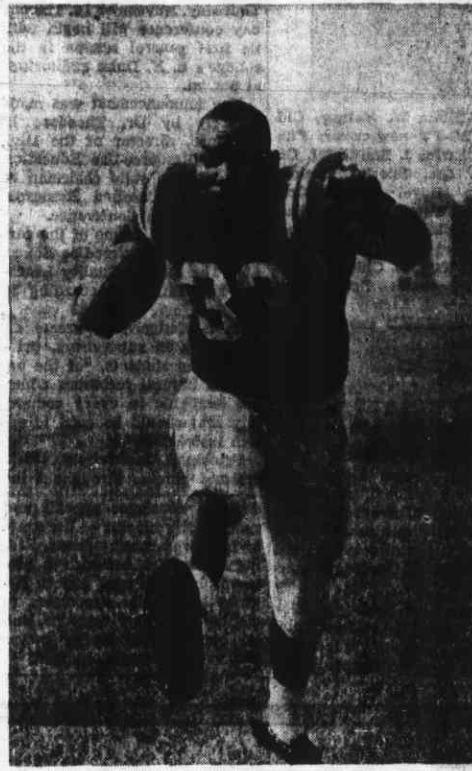
After both teams were scoreless in the third period, NCC launched a ground attack in which they marched 64 yards to the end zone.

On a series of carries by halfbacks Paul Perry, Robert Cunningham, and fullback Ben Cunningham, the Eagles lugged the pigskin into Trojan territory where Paul Perry scored from the three. The PAT was good, and the Eagles led 13-0.

The Trojans bounced back after receiving the kickoff. Quarterback Ed Golder galloped 89 yards into the end zone for the visitors' first score. When the PAT failed, NCC led 12-6.

The visitors struck back, however, and came back to score. After receiving the kickoff, they marched from their own 32 yard line to the Eagles' 32. From here, Golder threw a strike to halfback Melvin Swann, who went into the end zone untouched, making the score 19-12. The PAT failed with Eagles leading 19-12.

NCC will play Maryland State College next Saturday at Princess Anne, Maryland.

Showdown Battle Between Two Grid Powers Shaping up For Nov. 9

GREENSBORO — "Can the A and T College Aggies go all the way?" That is the big question being asked all about the town as the Aggies, without much sweat have rolled over five straight football opponents, mostly by decisive scores.

This early in the season, who the fans are really asking is, "Can A. and T. whip the Florida A. and M. University Rattlers?" Just in case you haven't heard that is the team which last season was rated number one among the nation's small colleges.

It is the same team, which has, as its star halfback, Bob Hayes, the "world's fastest human," world record holder in the 100 yard dash... and the same team which last year averaged better than 50-points per game against all opponents.

The Aggies will meet the power laden club from Florida in the big inter-sectional clash to be played here at Memorial Stadium on November 9.

To keep a clean slate even to early November, the Aggies have two major hurdles to cross. It's no easy path.

The undefeated Winston-Salem State College Rams will invade Greensboro on Saturday, October 26, and A. and T. will face defending CIAA champs, Morgan State College at Baltimore on November 2... then the Rattlers.

Winning four straight, this early in the season, is excitement enough for the average A. and T. fan, but the way the Greensboro Club did it has the loyal router in a dither.

The Aggies smashed the highly regarded Fort Eustis Wheels, 40-6; defeated the Tennessee State University Tigers, 20-18; trounced Shaw University Bears, 69-0, rolled over the scrappy Norfolk State Spartans 34-7, and Maryland 25-14 in consecutive order.

The Aggies are averaging better than 40-points per game, overall, and in the conference are doing better than 50-points in each outing.

The team, early this year, set for itself a goal of 40-points per game, in a balanced attack, half on the ground and the rest from the air. This represented a radical departure from the team's emphasis on a strong aerial game.

Bethune Rallies to Beat Morris Brown

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. — Bethune-Cookman College's Wildcats roared from behind with three touchdowns in the fourth quarter and a 29-15 homecoming victory over Morris Brown College at Memorial Stadium recently.

Trailing 15-4 going into the final quarter, the Wildcats sent the crowd of 4,000 into near bedlam with their belated surge.

Virginia Union Overcomes Winston-Salem, 22-14

RICHMOND, Va. — Virginia Union University defeated Winston-Salem State College, 22-14, in a Homecoming Classic here Saturday at Hovey Field before an estimated crowd of 4,900.

Despite the final spread, victory did not come very easily for the Panthers. Very much responsible for the win was a junior who came to Union from Washington three years ago and was told to turn in his practice uniform because he would not be needed. But Saturday young George Yancey successfully converted twice and gave the Panthers hope.

Hurt by freshmen mistakes all

during the first half, Union fell behind the Rams 14-0 in the first quarter. It looked as if the Homecoming spectators were in for a sad afternoon—but the baby Panthers bounced back with the running of halfback Davis and Frank Carr and the accurate passing of sophomore QB Carl Watson to Senior George Jenkins to beat the North Carolina Corps which was undefeated in competition this season.

Union was the underdog, but sound defensive play by the Richmonders in the fourth quarter, in which they collected 14 points, gave Coach Tom Harris a victory that is considered an upset in conference play.

James Milliner, Rams quarterback, hit Winston Mapp with a ten yard pass for the first Winston-Salem score. The same combination clicked for the two point conversion.

A few plays later, Milliner uncorked a 24 yard scoring pass to Dick Soules. The conversion at tempt failed.

Virginia Union roared back to set its first touchdown following the Rams' second score. Big play in the drive were 9 yard run by freshman Garland Witherspoon of Oxford, and a 63 yard scoring pass from Carl Watson to George Jenkins.

Then early in the fourth quarter, Watson hit halfback Jones Davis with a 63 yard pass, carrying to the Rams 13. Frank Carr capped the drive with a six yard jaunt.

Milton Marshall got the final Union TD on a 27 yard run.

AGGIES LOSE BRISTOW

GREENSBORO — William Bristow, end, who plays with the A. and T. College Aggies, will not see action with the team for the remainder of the season.

Bristow, a junior, 6-1, 186 pounder from Fayetteville, N. C., who this season has done much of the punting for the Aggies, suffered a fracture of the right leg last week in the football game against Norfolk State College, which was played at Portsmouth, Va.

A&T Stages 4th Quarter Rally To Defeat Maryland State 25-14

GREENSBORO—The A and T College Aggies stormed back with 13 points in the fourth quarter to whip the Maryland State College Hawks, 25-14, in a CIAA football game last Saturday in the Memorial Stadium.

Nearly 14,000 spectators, a record breaking homecoming crowd, saw the Aggies take their fifth victory in a row and keep their perfect record.

After scoring a touchdown in each of the first two quarters, A and T lost the 12-0 lead before a 14-point, third quarter outburst by the Maryland Club.

The Aggies steadied themselves in the fourth quarter and went on to win the ball game.

Cornell Gordon, Aggie quarterback, engineered the victory, by passing for one TD and making two of them himself with a 53 yard run from scrimmage and a

21-yard run return of a pass intercept.

The Aggie defense again shared in the glory of the win. Big men in that department were Joe Flood, center, who played only in brief periods, but came up with key tackles when the Hawks threatened; Howard Ferguson, a tackle, and John Brooks, at end.

The first Aggie score came with 43-seconds left in the first quarter as Gordon passed to Clifton Matthews for six yards, capping a 70-yard drive.

The Aggies scored again two minutes later as Gordon ripped around end on a 53-yard gallop back in the third quarter with a 30-yard off-tackle burst by Cedric Suggs and an 80-yard run following an interception of a Gordon pass by Emerson Boozer, James Privott split the uprights following both TD's.

Melvin Phillips, sophomore halfback from Shelby, put the Aggies back in front midway the fourth period with a 72-yard run from scrimmage. The score put the Aggies ahead for good, 18-14.

The scoring was concluded a Gordon picked off a pass by Charles Stukes, Hawk quarterback on the Maryland 21-yard line and went over untouched. Alfred Maloney's kick was good, for the 25-14 victory.

The officials penalized A. and T. 235-yards and Maryland State 150-yards.

A. and T. is now 3-0 in the CIAA. Maryland State is 1-3-0. The Aggies will be at home to Winston-Salem State on Saturday

Raleigh's Pat White Ruins Hillside

Ligon High School's White (Pat) White proved to Durham football fans he was as great as his admirers had said as he personally ruined Hillside's hopes of an undefeated season by leading the Raleigh team to a 25-9 victory at County Stadium.

The all-around, triple threat quarterback was easily the game's outstanding player as he scored Ligon's first three touchdowns and set in the fourth with his half-handling wizardry.

After the contest, shocked Durham fans agreed that White was about the best high school football player to perform in County stadium.

White was both the brains and brawn of the Ligon team in its victory last Friday night. He called the plays from his quarterback slot, reeled off three impossible long touchdowns, runs, set up the other Ligon runners with his amazing ball handling, handled most of the passing chores and set the Raleigh defenses from his halfback slot.

About the only thing he didn't do was help the game officials mark the Raleigh first downs.

White got his first touchdown on a 67 yard run around end. He started to the outside, faked two defenders, picked up a key block then easily outraced the Hornet team to score after the second quarter was only moments old.

On the following exchange of downs, White maneuvered the Raleigh team to Hillside's 20, then settled matters by sweeping the flanks again for 20 yards and the second Ligon touchdown.

The big play in this drive was set up by White's ball handling fakery. Deep in Raleigh territory, White completely fooled the Hillside defenses and sent speedy Wal-
