the time he moved to Cincinnati, Bell had become deeply interested in the anti-slavery cause. There on the borderline between the North and South, he was in the midst of the exciting scenes of hairbreadth escapes and the drama of the pursuit of fugitives which channeled the escaped. He actively participated in the Underground Railroad Movement, slaves across Ohio to other parts of the North just one step from their pursuers. He spent much of his time on the anti-slavery

lecture platform where he became noted for his speeches.

Because Bell did not feel that he had sufficient freedom as a man in this country, he moved to Canada in 1854 and remained there until 1860. He became a good friend of John Brown and helped him assemble men for the 1859 raid on Harper's Ferry. In 1860, Bell left Canada for California where he assumed an active role in attempting to improve the lot of the Negro in that state. However, he left California in 1865 and returned to Toledo, Ohio, where he resumed touring the state making speeches in behalf of the Negro race

At the same time he began to read some of his own poetry from the lecture platform.

Some of Bell's poems which evoked considerable interest are: "Emancipation," "Lincoln," "The Dawn of Freedom," "Valedictory on Leaving San Francisco," "Song for the First of August," and "The Future of America in the Unity of Races."

Bell died in 1902 at the age of 76.

## Asks Ban on Hiring of Kin

NEW YORK — The Supreme Court of the State of New York has been asked to ban the current practice among construction trades unions of selecting apprentices on the basis of the applicant's relationship with members of the unions.

The petition for the ban is in the form of an amendment to a previously filed complaint, scheduled for hearing in the Supreme Court today, Monday, Oct. 14.

The original complaint, filed Sept. 24, seeks an injunction restraining state and city officials from "entering into any contracts for public construction for which recruitment or hiring of employees is to be done through" unions as long as "such unions continue their practice and policy of unlawful discrimination on the basis of race or color."

The amended complaint, filed at the hearing opened by attorneys for the NAACP and the Joint Committee for Equal Employment Opportunity, seeks a court ruling requiring the defendant unions to discard their present waiting list for apprenticeship training programs and membership ad to replace them with new lists "determined by fair tests universally applied."
