Theme for this year's conference was "Utilization of newer Instructional Media for the Improvement of Teaching and Learning." The conference opened with an All-College Convocation at Livingstone with Dr. S. E. Duncan, president of the college; and Mrs. Alice Green, president of the North Carolina Department of Supervisors and supervisor of Wilson schools, delivering welcoming address; Dr. Kara V. Jackson, professor of education and Director of Student Personnel Services, Grambling College in Louisiana, gave the opening address at the convocation.

Others addressing the national conference included: Mrs. Josi B. Sessoms, Savannah, Ga., president of NACS, who made an annual address; Dr. E. Ohler Miller, professor of psychology, University of Tennessee, Knoxville who addressed the group on "Educational Programming and Learning"; A. H. Peeler, high school principal, Greensboro; James E. Parker, director of the Audio-Visual Aids Center, North Carolina College, Durham; and Dr. J. C. Dixon, Executive Director of the Southern Education Fund, Atlanta, Ga.

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Where Statesville, North Carolina Sits at This Time

STATEVILLE — Statesville is a small city in the piedmont section of North Carolina. For one who would know North Carolina only in the terms of its larger cities, Statesville is located forty-two miles north of Charlotte, and fifty-two miles west of Winston-Salem. This is where Statesville sits in the terms of geography. This city has about as much industry as any city in North Carolina of its size. It has a quiet physical disposition. Generally the streets down town are almost deserted at 10:00 p. m. For one who is seeking to get away from the hustle and bustle that is characteristic in most industrial cities, it would appear that he had reached the city where he would retire in peaceful rest. But this is not all of our city, nor is it descriptive of its behavior. There is an adverse spirit that is latent, and powerful that one must reckon with both as a citizen or a neighbor of this city. This force is racial hatred. The recent recall election which ousted all six members of City Council because they attempted to do what was right in removing segregation from a city owned swimming pool, is evidence that the balance of the voting power is still on the side of the evil of segregation. Moreover, the campaign for the recall election was purely one of hate based on race. By now it should have unfolded to you where Statesville sits. At present Statesville is a powder keg.

This does not indict nor include all the people in Statesville. There is still a minority, but strong force in Statesville, that is seeking to do what is right for all people. It is the moral fiber of this group that has held the lid on the keg. However, no one in Statesville or Iredell County can be absolved from his or her responsibility in allowing Statesville to come to the precarious position she now has. The condition in Statesville did not happen overnight. There is a certain editor whom

I shall refer to as Mr. Certainty. Mr. Certainty's heart has served as a generator for racial hatred his tongue has lashed out with venom that is better controlled in rattle snakes; moral decency has had little to do with the control of the stroke of his pen, and vengeance has been the pattern of his behavior.

If violence should come among there is bloodshed. Mr. Certainty will bear a greater responsibility than any other man or woman in Iredell County. The blood will drip from his fingers and the name of the victim will be stamped on his tongue. Though, before the people attempt to exonerate themselves by shifting the blame to one man, let us remember, we acted individually, adult individuals and we must bear the guilt and shame of our action. We are sure that the cheap low and sordid method used in campaigning for the racial election or travesty of justice will some day come home to haunt the conscience of the people who allowed themselves to be dupes to the evil will of men whose scruples had become convenient tools within ends within themselves. How can the church open tomorrow without facing this dastardly action committed against humanity? How can its members continue to claim allegiance to the Christian Faith without a sense of guilt or condemnation for the wrong rendered other human beings? It is worthy to emphasize that the condition we now find ourselves did not happen overnight. There has been a constant stream of racial hatred that has poured from a certain newspaper for a number of years in this community. Yet we have sat relatively comfortable and allowed this condition to develop. There is a question that faces every community, and that is whether the denouement who brings a community to the disgrace that Statesville had just experienced, should bear any more guilt than who sit idly or sunnily by and allow the condition to develop.
