concerning the social revolution in this country as represented by the conflicts in Birmingham. Spq continued: "The Baha'i World Faith is the solution to these man-made barriers of race, nation class, and religion in its divine source and the realization that this is the age when the unity of man kind under one God must be realized as well as the fundamental oneness of religion." In concluding remarks in an interview, she referred to a Baha'i quotation: "Religion is a radiant light and an impregnable stronghold for the protection and welfare of the peoples of the world. Should the lamp of religion be obscured, chaos and confusion will ensue, and the lights of fairness, of justice, of tranquility and peace cease to shine."

### Robert Jones is Youth President

Robert Jones, an elder in the Church of God in Christ Jesus, New Deal, Inc., was elected president of the Youth Department of the Church during the annual meeting of the Southern Diocese of the Church in Durham last week.

Elder Jones, who has served as assistant pastor of the Durham church on Queen Street, will be in charge of the church's youth program throughout the Diocese. The Diocese includes churches at Roxboro, Andler, Weldon, East Rock, Robbins, Windsor, Auland, Greenville and Ahoskie.

The new Youth-president is a Durham native, and a graduate of Hillside High School. He attended North Carolina College and several courses in religious instruction offered by the Church. He also served for three years under the late Bishop C. L. Faison, spiritual leader of the movement.

Churches from approximately nine cities in N. C. were represented at the meeting in Durham last week-end.

Three persons were ordained during the meeting. Two men were conferred the mantle of deaconship, while one woman was ordained as a minister.

Dr. Knight, who assumed the presidency of Duke University in September, is a native of Cambridge, Massachusetts. Holder of A. B., M. A., and Ph.D. degrees from Yale University and the LL.D. degree from Ripon College, in Wisconsin, he has taught at Yale and the University of Southern California. ### Last Rites Held For Wm. M. Forte

Last rites for William McKinley Forte, 56, husband of Mrs. Minnie Mae Tuten Forte, were held at White Rock Baptist Church here, Tuesday, October 22, at 4:00 p. m. The Rev. Miles Mark Fisher, pastor of the church delivered the eulogy.

Forte was born in Roxboro, North Carolina, the son of the late Ashley Forte and Mrs. Ardenia Forte July 17, 1907. He succumbed, Saturday, October 19, as the result of a heart attack at Lincoln Hospital.

For 15 years Forte was employed at Duke Hospital as a chief cook. At the time of his death, he held a position as a fireman in the Durham City School System.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Minnie M. Forte, a teacher at Fayetteville State Teachers College; two sons, William, Jr. and Lonnie, one daughter, Miss Minnie Mae and one sister, Mrs. Vera Owens.

Since 1940 he had been a member of White Rock and served on the Usher Board, Male Chorus and as a member of the Moore Bible Class.

Interment was at Beechwood Cemetery.

evidence they had gathered since the murder investigation.  
Sheriff Rumble said Greene told him he "was crazy mad" at the Mrs. Rogers and killed her in a rage following a dispute over an insurance claim.

According to the Sheriff, Greene told him that Mrs. Rogers, an agent for American Bankers Life Insurance Co., came to his apartment about 1 p. m., Friday and a heated argument ensued over a claim in a policy he owned.

Sheriff Rumble said the man told him that he shot the woman near the hairline with a .22 calibre German make pistol then shot her twice more.

He left the body in the bedroom until nightfall, then removed her clothes, burned them in the kitchen and dumped the woman's body in a graveyard.

Greene who was recently released from prison after serving an eight year sentence for assaulting a Negro in Hendersonville with a pipe wrench, is scheduled to get a hearing after the current term of Superior Court ends.

Trial of Mrs. Eula Steele Laney popular Durham beautician, on charges of assault in connection with the shooting of a man in a Hayti restaurant, was continued this week until Nov. 5.

The victim of the incident, which took place early Wednesday, Oct. 16, James Plater, was hospitalized with a bullet injury in the groin.

The shooting took place at Isler's Grill, located on East Pettigrew street in the Hayti business district. Police reports said Mrs. Laney fired on the man when he attacked her with a chair.
