Bennett College Assets Now Totalling \$6 Million

GREENSBORO — A substantial increase in the endowment, combined with the physical plant and other assets, gives Bennett College total assets of approximately six million dollars, trustees of the institution were told at their annual meeting at the College Saturday.

C. Everett Bacos, of New York City, chairman of the institution's investment committee was the source of this information and the college treasurer reported that the college last year received gifts and grants for special purposes in excess of \$400,000.

Theme of this year's meeting was "Strengthening the Educational Program at Bennett College Through Self-Study and Projection." In keeping with

this, Dr. F. L. Grandison, a member of the psychology faculty, better-prepared freshman class. Long-range projections for the college over a 10 year period presented by Dr. George Breaugh, chairman of a faculty-staff committee, concerned with the future plans of the college, showed that within the next four years, enrollment figures should reach the 800 mark and should reach 1,000 by 1970-71.

These projections look toward the expansion of physical facilities to include two new residence halls, a modern science building, a classroom building and a fine arts building, among others.

Dr. F. D. Patterson, of New York City, chairman of the board said that Bennett is aware of the tremendous enrollment pressures that are building up and plans to meet the demands of the next decade. He also called attention to the forthcoming visit to the college on Tuesday of representatives of the Ford Foundation, which only recently announced a gift of \$15 million to the 32 colleges which comprise the United Negro College Fund.

"Of this grant, \$10 million is to be distributed among selected UNCF institutions, and because

this number, of necessity, will be small, the fact that Bennett has been selected for a visitation makes us happy."

President Willa B. Player called attention to the fact that 83 per cent of Bennett's graduates are working and that 15 per cent of them hold degrees above the bachelor's level. This number is increasing annually, she said. She also reported that construction of the new health and physical education building is proceeding on schedule and that the facility should be completed by March, 1964.

Dr. Charles E. Garth, director of the Saturday School for talented junior and senior high school girls, said that the school, now in its third year, accepted 79 girls this fall. He introduced two of them who told the trustees how the school has helped them in their college preparation.

Three new trustees were introduced. They are Dr. Dorothy Brown, of Nashville, Tenn.; an alumna; Mrs. William Strother, of Philadelphia, Pa.; and Mrs. Niles Clark of Waterloo, S. C. All officers were re-elected and the trustees approved for one year's trial, adding disability insurance to the fringe benefits of faculty and staff.

Dawson's Folk Symphony Issued By Decca Co.

More Understanding of Human Hopes, Needs Cited by Patterson

GREENSBORO — The need for a fuller understanding of the inter-relatedness of human aspirations and needs as a means of helping to bring a fuller life to people everywhere was emphasized by Dr. F. D. Patterson, of New York City, in his Founders' Day address at Bennett College Sunday.

Dr. Patterson, chairman of the college trustee board, spoke on "Bennett College as An Increasing Purpose," and paid tribute to the late Dr. David D. Jones who set about to establish a college for the education of young women as a man with an idea

whose time had come. "An idea is valuable if its time has come and if he who conceives it prepared to offer the dedicated labor required to insure its acceptance," he said. "Dr. Jones came forth with an idea that was timely both in terms of need and acceptance. So great was his devotion to it that he inspired others to share it with him."

Dr. Patterson traced the development of the college, not only in providing quality education for women, but in involving itself with community problems. The Children's House, the annual Homecoming Institute, civil rights and the Saturday School were cited as examples of this involvement.

Stressing the great need for continuity in this purpose, he said: "As the nation clears away the impediments of discrimination and segregation, it merely frees all of its citizens to join, unhindered, in the herculean task of achieving a life of stability at home and the strength required to work effectively for peace and prosperity of mankind everywhere."

"First, we must realize that the elimination of barriers based on race will produce inconsequential results unless there is a readiness to embrace opportunities hitherto denied. We are fast reaching the point where the greatest problem Negro Americans and other minorities in this country face is the small numbers adequately prepared to take advantage of the many opportunities increasingly available."

Spaulding One Of Leaders To Be Honored in Chi

Asa T. Spaulding, President of North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company was to be among the twelve influential Negro leaders in various fields of endeavor from throughout the nation and the State of Indiana to be honored during the "Century of Negro Progress Exposition" to be presented in Indianapolis, October 25 to 27 by the Indiana Division of the American Negro Emancipation Centennial Authority.

The presentation of Frederick Douglass Centennial Award to outstanding personalities in areas ranging from civil rights to music was made on opening night by Indiana Governor Matthew E. Welsh. The exposition will be held in the Manufacturers Building of the State Fair grounds.

Expected in Indianapolis to accept the awards in addition to Spaulding are Reverend Martin Luther King, president of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference; Marian Anderson and Leontyne Price, noted opera singers; Dr. Ralph Bunche, United Nations Under-Secretary, and John H. Johnson, president of Johnson Publishing Company Chicago.

Also Thurgood Marshall, U. S. District Court Judge and former legal council for the NAACP; Sidney Poitier, acclaimed actor; A. Philip Randolph, president, Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters and Civil Rights leader; Jackie Robinson, former baseball great and current civil rights leader.

Witnesses Set 3 Day Meet

About 72 delegates from the South Unit Congregation of Jehovah's Witnesses here in Durham will attend a three-day circuit convention in Chapel Hill, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday, November 1-3, according to a statement made here by O. M. Stokes, local presiding minister.

The meeting will be held at the Lincoln High School in Chapel Hill. More than 400 witnesses from 16 cities and communities are expected.

Sessions will begin Friday, November 1, at 8:45 p. m. and continue through Sunday, November 3, until 6:00 p. m. The theme of this three-day seminar, sponsored by the Watchtower Society, is centered around Paul's words to the Colossians at Colossians 4:17: "Keep watching the ministry... that you fulfill it." The progress of the circuit during the past six months will be reviewed. Ways and means of successfully coping with the problems of the Christian ministry will also be discussed. The program will include round-table discussions, skits and demonstrations.

The featured event of this Chapel Hill meeting will be a public discourse Sunday at 3:00 p. m. by the district supervisor, Willie Anderson. The subject of the address will be, "The Bible Triumphs in a Scientific World." The public is cordially invited to attend all sessions, he said.
