GI Bill Trainees Pastor Tells Why He's Oppose to Minstrel Show in Magazine Article

WINSTON-SALEM—The Veterans Administration has completed arrangements for an early mailing of training checks to GI Bill trainees in North Carolina.

Arrangements have been made with the Treasury Department, Regional Disbursing Office to mail training allowance checks to veterans and war orphans on December 12 instead of the normal mailing date of December 19. Thus trainees will receive their November training checks before North Carolina schools recess for the Christmas holidays.

J. D. DeRamus, Manager, North Carolina Veterans Administration Regional Office, said, however that in order to receive checks early, monthly certifications of training should be promptly completed by trainees after they have completed the full November training course.

BALTIMORE, Md.—"How to Say No to a Minstrel Show" is the title of an article by the Rev. Carroll A. Doggett, Jr., pastor of the Loch Raven Methodist Church, Baltimore, which appears in the November 21st issue of THE CHRISTIAN ADVOCATE, the fortnightly magazine of The Methodist Church for clergymen and professional religious workers.

"Church program committees occasionally suggest a minstrel show as an activity of one of the church's organizations. As a pastor, I oppose this," Mr. Doggett writes, "and here's why:

"Blackfaced minstrel shows are based on degrading stereotypes. They seek to make humor based on unfair and untrue conceptions of Negro life. These shows portray shiftless, ragged tramps shooting dice, joking about chicken stealing and the women they lust after or the work they've shied away from. Such topics are simply out of step with the witness a Chris-

Savory Apple-Sausage Casserole Topped With Cornbread Wedges

As it comes from the oven, this casserole gives forth the fine fruity fragrance of apples, the meat aroma of browned sausages, the invitation of fresh, hot cornbread. Well it might for it offers the three favorites, canned apple sauce, sausages and cornbread combined in a savory new dish.

First, the apple sauce with a good piece of butter, brown sugar and lemon juice to dress it up. Half the browned sausages are put right in with the apple sauce, the cornbread batter poured on top and the whole baked. Then the remainder of the browned sausages are laid on top, and back into the oven the dish goes. So you have sausages below deck and on top, with a gentle bubble of apple sauce coming up in the center and between the cornbread wedges... all most flavorful.

| 4 cups canned apple sauce | 1 cup flour |
| 1/4 cup brown sugar | 3 teaspoons baking powder |
| 1/4 teaspoon salt | 1 teaspoon salt |
| 2 tablespoons butter | 1/2 cup cornmeal |
| 2 tablespoons lemon juice | 2 tablespoons shortening |
| 1/4 cup water | 1 egg |
| 1 pound tiny sausages (about 14-16) | 1/4 teaspoon instant onion |
| | 1 cup milk |

In a greased 3-quart casserole, combine apple sauce, sugar, salt, butter, lemon juice and water; place in hot oven 400 degrees, to heat while preparing remainder of recipe (about 15 minutes).

Prick sausages well, place in cold skillet; add hot water to cover and bring to a boil. Drain, then brown. Arrange half the sausages on top of apple sauce in casserole; reserve remaining sausages for use later in recipe.

Sift flour with baking powder and salt; stir in cornmeal. Cut in shortening. Mix egg, onion and milk; stir all at once into dry ingredients. Use a wet spoon to drop cornbread mixture on top of apple-sausage mixture; cover, using a doubled piece of heavy foil if necessary. Return casserole to hot oven and steam for 20 minutes. Remove cover and place remaining browned sausages in spaces between cornbread. Return to hot oven for an additional 15 minutes baking, uncovered. Makes 8 servings.
