**HARDWOOD ACTION** this week was ed hot and furious as area cagers settled down to the job of "unplugging the heavy end of their schedules. No less than three of Durham's teams remained undefeated as the season moved into the second week of the new year. Little River, currently riding the crest of a 14 game winning streak is the only varsity team with a perfect score. However, Hillside and Merrick-Moore junior varsity clubs have posted 80 skins and show indications of remaining undefeated until they clash later in the month. In junior high circles, Whitt's Vikings continued their winning ways by racking up their second victory of the young season against no. 10. The J. W. Parker Junior High Cagers finished the opposition in the second encounter and went on to bite the dust 70-53 as Carter Whitaker paced the Vikings with a 17 point performance.

**HORNETS EVEN RECORD** Hillside's visiting Hornets—well their fast break eluding with precision—jumped off to an early lead and rolled to a 71-54 decision over the Booker T. **FMC Rated 8th In Small College Cagers of Nation**

**ST. AUGUSTINE** — Walter McDougal, one of Florida Memorial College's Lions, was rated 8th top basketball scorer among the smaller colleges of the nation as of December 28, according to a bulletin released by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau. McDougal has made an average of 30.8 points per game thus far played this season. A native of Brandford, Florida, McDougal first played basketball at O'Brien High, of Sumner, Florida. A senior and mid-term graduate at FMC, he will be playing his final game when the Lions clash with the Edward Waters Tigers in a homecoming encounter on Florida Memorial's campus January 11. 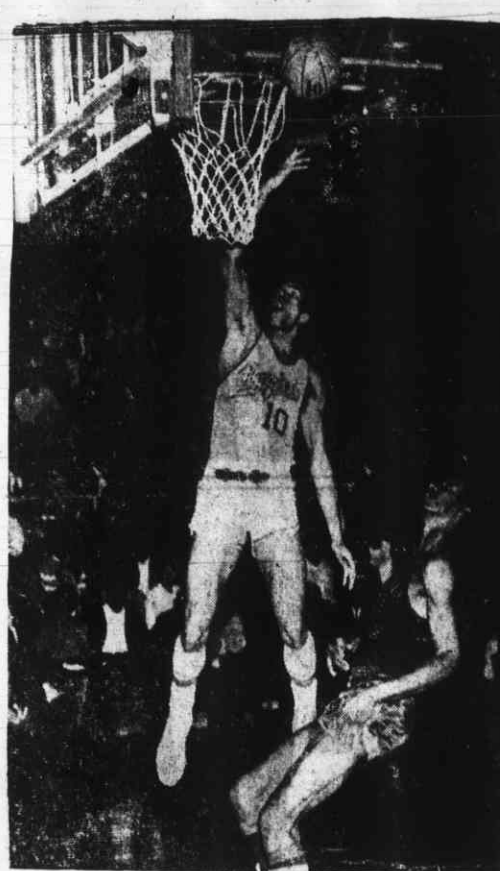

**Fishing School At Hatteras, N.C. To Be Repeated**

An education in "thinking like a fish," will again be available at Hatteras, North Carolina, through the 13th annual Short Course in Sport Fishing June 14. The Short Course is sponsored by North Carolina State of the University of North Carolina, Raleigh, through its General Extension Division. Expert anglers and battery of wildlife specialists and zoologists from N. C. State comprise the faculty. The course is open to both men and women, with enrollment limited to 65. Hatteras, a renowned salt water fishing locale on North Carolina's Outer Banks, offer fishermen an almost unlimited choice of gamefish in localities ranging from the nearby Gulf Stream to inlets, Pamlico Sound and fresh water ponds. The Short Course is designed to give novice and expert anglers the extra know-how needed to increase their chances of success whether they fish from boats, surf, or piers. Classes stress the latest techniques of angling, and laboratory sessions are fishing trips which allow students to put their knowledge to good use. An all-day trip to the Gulf Stream is one of the five-day course. During the 1963 Short Course one student caught a 340-pound blue marlin, and others brought back tuna, bonito and a wide assortment of other species. Short Course students and faculty are housed in modern motels at Hatteras, and classroom sessions are in a local school. An illustrated brochure on the Short Course, with applications forms for advance enrollment is available from the Division of General Extension, Box 5125, State College Station, Raleigh, North Carolina.

## North Carolina College Meets A&T Fri. in Greensboro Coliseum

The North Carolina College Eagles and the North Carolina A. and T. Aggies will meet in an arch-rival CIAA contest Friday, January 17, in the Greensboro Coliseum. A large crowd is expected for the 8 o'clock tap-off of a game which was originally scheduled for Saturday, January 18. Last year, NCC and A. and T. met in five exciting games, with the Aggies winning four to the Eagles' one. Coach Floyd Brown's cagers defeated the Aggies 69-68 in the opening round of the Tipoff Tournament in Durham. But in the next four meetings between the arch-rivals, Coach Cal Irving's hoopsters were unstoppable. A. and T. defeated NCC 91-79 in an overtime in the finals of the Holiday Festival at Winston-Salem. During regular season play, the Aggies took a convincing 81-64 victory in the Gate City and sound the Eagles 68-65 in Durham. Then, with all the marbles in the ring in the CIAA tournament in Winston-Salem, A. and T., with a strong second half comeback sparked by Hugh Evans, defeated NCC 79-70 in the opening of the dribble derby. ## Report Pro-Amateur Ski Conflict Spreads to Future Olympics Games

**NEW YORK** — Amateur ski officials, who are out to "knock off" professional skiing around the world, are reported to be "playing politics" over the site of future Winter Olympic Games, the current (January) issue of Ski magazine said today. "The most recent twist was cancellation of a planned Japanese trip for the pros, presumably because of pressure from the FIS (Federation Internationale de Ski) on the Japanese Ski Federation," Tom Corcoran wrote in Ski.

"The FIS is reported to have told the Japanese that if they allow the International Professional Ski Racing Association to come to Japan this winter, Japan might as well forget their aspirations of hosting a winter Olympics," said Corcoran. He pointed out that the "live-and-let-live" attitude of amateur competitors is in "sharp contrast" to the stand taken by their officials. "Why amateur officialdom has been so frenetic in its crusading zeal to crush the pros is a little hard to understand," Corcoran declared in Ski. "The impassioned speeches depicting the pros as contaminants are best received on ski convention floors, not on slalom hills."

Corcoran said the amateur organizations in the U. S. and abroad "have raised one hurdle after another in their determination to knock off IPSRA. The USSA has written a set of rules designed to discourage clubs from sponsoring professional races, and the FIS has effectively kept IPSRA out of Europe where ski racing is a major spectator sport."

He said that a major problem facing professional skiers is that "the top amateurs are unquestionably better than the pros—and know it. The USSA could kill the pro circuit much faster than with its current methods by sanctioning a series of pro-am meets that would show the public they get a better show for nothing from the amateurs."

"The chances of a pro-am meet are very slim, however, primarily because the USSA believes IPSA's assertion that the pros are better. "Why are the amateurs better? For two reasons: the amateurs are in better physical shape and race on a higher competitive level. Somehow the level of competition must be upgraded if professional ski racing is to survive for any length of time. "It is vital to the success of the pros that new blood be brought in after the Olympics," Corcoran stated in Ski.

Outclassing the Highlanders by intermission, Greyhound Porter took scoring honors with 21 points while grabbing 20 rebounds. Big Bobby Edmonds opened the scoring with the game's first two buckets and ended the evening with 20 points. Using a full-court press from the opening gun, Coach Harold Hunter's Chargers (now 8-4) had doubled the score (32-16) on Highlanders with 9:50 still remaining in the first half. Co-trotting both bank boards, Hunter's returners found the range with 40 of 90 shots from the field and hauled in 71 rebounds before the final whistle.
