A Pretty Valentine Table... To set a pretty Valentine table use pink and red for a festive motif instead of the traditional red and white. If you don't have a pink tablecloth, use a pink sheet for the table. Red hearts in attractive designs can be attached with cellophane tape and look lovely with the pink background. One word of caution, though, use construction paper rather than crepe paper for your decorations. If something is spilled on the crepe paper it could make a permanent stain on your cloth.

If you want heart-shaped gelatin for pretty salads but don't want to invest in heart-shaped molds, here's an easy way to achieve the same effect. Make your gelatin in a square cake pan and use a heart-shaped cookie cutter to make the individual portions.

It's Time To Select Fabrics for Spring... For women who sew, the early months of the year mean it is time to choose fabrics for their spring and summer wardrobes.

The selection of types of fabrics on the market today is endless. You as a modern seamstress can choose from dozens of fabrics and though you can suit the fabric to the occasion, it is almost impossible for the average home seamstress to be familiar with all qualities of all the fabrics that are available today.

To be practical as well as chic, you should be just as careful in the selection of fabrics as you are in choosing a pattern and turning a fine seam. Hasty and unwise purchases can too easily result in shrunken, faded or discolored garments.

Along with selecting fabrics carefully should go the task of choosing the thread with as much care.

Mercerized cotton thread is a wise choice. There is a heavy duty thread for play clothes and heavy draperies and a regular thread for lighter weight fabrics. Nylon thread should not be used with fabrics which will be ironed with a hot iron. The nylon would fuse and melt. Try the nylon thread, however, when sewing with stretch fabrics because it has a greater elasticity than cotton.

Always choose thread a shade darker than the color of your fabric. It will stick lighter. On new type fabrics, make a test seam and adjust tension on your sewing machine. You may want to use tissue paper on the fabric to prevent puckering and also the snagging of looped fabrics with the pressure foot.

Remove Yellow From White Wool... Is your white winter wool yellowing? If it has yellowed because of strong soap or from hot water you may be able to get it white by soaking it in a solution of two tablespoons of hydrogen peroxide to one gallon of cool water. If your wool garment has yellowed from too high of a temperature setting in ironing or from chlorine bleach, then it probably will not get white again.
