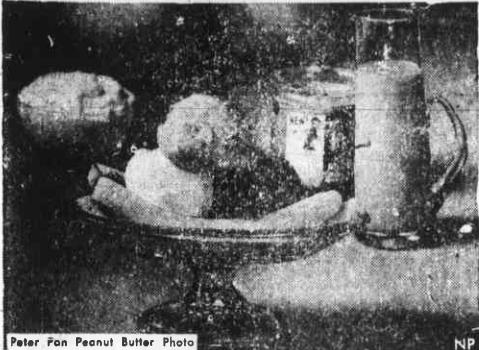


### Peanut Butter "Bananza"

## Charles Womack Speaks Out on School Shake-up

Certain men are born to lead, others to follow. The fact that a man has proven himself in one area of the arena is not license to assume that he is the 'dean of the big tent'. No man is born knowing the appalling affair of a college community nor how to handle them. It takes time to make the wheels of events mesh, and yes, for a president to dominate them.

It takes time, no matter how skilled the man chosen, to get to know his skills talents, his limitations and to know therefore how to weigh his advice for his own ultimate evaluations. It takes time to live with problems, to know how to alleviate the intractable ones, to grapple with those that are urgent. And so we come to the impending crisis so-called at North Carolina College. While this should have been the year of inquiry and speculation, it has suddenly erupted into a nightmare of horrendous polemical dispositions. The community is there fore asking the question, What is happening?

I do not know what is politically feasible, but, I do know that a man should be ruled by reason and common sense. I know that you do not experiment with a college administration, nor are you expected to remain forever conservative. But when the first report card is issued it should be the teacher's job to tell the pupil where improvements can and should be made even if to say that, 'I'll have to relegate you to a lesser role. The word demotion attached to a normal progress report tends to make other faculty and staff members ill at ease as it has; Blank stares have adorned the faces of the NCC classroom instructor where normally confidence and serenity prevailed.

And yet the last persons to be fooled is academic circles is always the students. They were not fooled in or about the issues that manifested themselves in the school year 1963-64. Long before a national body had given a vote of "No Confidence" to the present administration, one or more students had affixed the symbol of a onetime infamous ex-dictator to the door of whom they considered their chief antagonist. What ever is assumed in this type of expression, should be noteworthy, but we say don't take it lightly, for a sweet tasting poison is cast only lead to annihilation if you continue to eat thereof.

Platform Services will be held at Bethel Church, Sunday, August 16, at 3:00 a.m. Come on out and enjoy these services. You are invited.

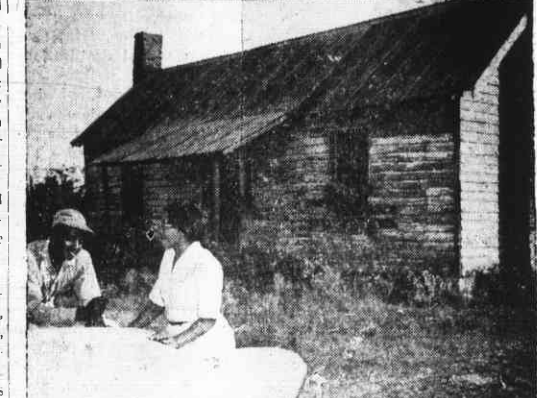
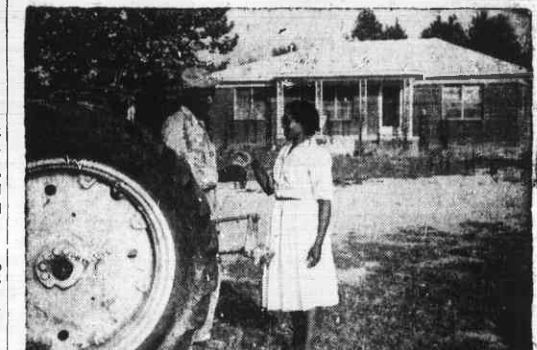
**MISSIONARY CIRCLE MEETS**
