Dr. John R. Larkins, of the North Carolina State Department of Welfare, will be the keynote speaker at the formal opening of the Ushers Home for unwed mothers Sunday, June 28, at 1:30 p. m. in Franklin.

Mrs. Roxie Small, who formerly operated a home for aged in Pittsboro, will supervise the facility and maintain residence on the premises.

The home will be operated in connection with the Ushers Home by the Interdenominational Ushers Association.

Due to limited facilities, the number of women to be accommodated has been initially limited to five or six. However, plans are being made to provide additional space to increase the home's capacity in the future.

Music for the occasion will be provided by the Durham Ushers Union Chorus. L. E. Austin is president of the Interdenominational Ushers Association.

All Ushers and interested persons are invited to hear Dr. Larkins and witness the dedicatory service.

WASHINGTON D. C. — Mrs. Minnie Hartsfield, who has been with the Veterans Administration's Nursing Service since 1939, has been appointed Psychiatric Nursing Specialist for the Nursing Appraisal and Program Development Division in Washington, D. C.

She is the first Negro Nurse to be named to a top position on the central office staff of Director of Nursing Cecilia H. Hauge.

A graduate of Tuskegee Institute, Mrs. Hartsfield received her Master's Degree in Nursing Education at Columbia University.

Mrs. Hartsfield was associated with the VA's Research program in Chicago before joining Miss Hauge's staff on July 1, 1964. Previously she had been at the Danville, Ill., Salisbury, Downey Ill., and Tuskegee VA Hospitals.

MISS. GETS FIRST NEGRO DEPUTY U. S. MARSHAL

JACKSON, MISS. — Following NAACP requests to the U. S. Department of Justice, James Middleton was appointed the first Negro U. S. Deputy Marshal in the State of Mississippi this week. No Negro has ever held this position here before.

Students Receive Thousands In Funds For Medical School Study

\$97,500 Given To Eighty-eight Young Scholars

CHICAGO, Ill. — Grants totaling \$97,500 made to 88 Negro students to attend medical school were announced this week by Dr. Franklin C. McLean, Secretary and Treasurer of National Medical Fellowships, Inc., and Professor Emeritus, Department of Physiology, University of Chicago. This is the largest number of awards made by National Medical Fellowships, Inc. in its 18-year history.

In commenting on their purpose and significance, Dr. McLean said, "In authorizing these grants, the Board of Directors of National Medical Fellowships, Inc., seeks to demonstrate that the qualified Negro applicant has opportunities for acceptance in medical school equal to those of qualified white applicants. The 88 winners of 1964-65 scholarships and grants-in-aid will study at 40 U.S. medical schools. In 1947 there were only 20 predominantly white medical schools that had Negroes enrolled. We feel some progress has been achieved."

Ten of the awards are the coveted four-year NATIONAL MEDICAL - SLOAN FOUNDATION. See MEDICINE on page 4A.

Senator Hubert Humphrey Urges NAACP Delegates to Support CR

WASHINGTON, D. C. — Senate Majority Whip Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) this week urged members of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People to assist government at all levels to help make the new civil rights law work.

Humphrey, floor manager of the bill that passed the Senate last Friday, said he would like to see all organizations in the civil rights movement "spending as much time in the halls of government as on the streets."

"I would like to see them invited to give their advice and their help in translating the provisions of the Civil Rights Act from words on the statute books into living realities in our cities, in our states, and in our nation," he told the NAACP annual convention.

"I believe the key to our success is a living, working partnership between white and Negro Americans."

Humphrey suggested that participants in the civil rights movement work actively for better educational facilities and enlist in the war against poverty.

Dr. Rufus Perry To Attend Church Meet in Germany

CHARLOTTE — Dr. Rufus P. Perry, president of Johnson C. Smith University, has been appointed one of the delegates to the Nineteenth General Council meeting of the Presbyterian World Alliance. The meeting will be held in Frankfurt on the Main, West Germany.

Dr. Perry will be one of sixty delegates from the United Presbyterian Church, U. S. A. The meeting will begin on August 3 and will close on August 13. Dr. Perry is to attend a meeting on Sunday afternoon, August 2, with the delegation from the United Church.

At the 176th General Assembly of the United Presbyterian Church, Dr. Perry was elected to a three-year term on the Board of National Missions. The Board carries responsibility for a mission program in the United States and the West Indies. He was also appointed to the Department of Ministerial Relations for a three-year term. A further appointment for a three-year term makes Dr. Perry a member of the North American Alliance Area of the World Presbyterian Alliance.

In addition to the responsibilities which Dr. Perry has been called upon to discharge for the Church, he has been asked to serve his state. Governor Terry Sanford has selected him as one

Federal Court Orders End to 'Private' Schools

NEW YORK, N. Y. — A major breakthrough in school integration took place yesterday when a federal district court put an end to private schools and tuition grants often utilized by southern communities seeking to avoid integration.

Jack Greenberg, director-counsel, NAACP Legal Defense Fund, which won the ruling, today applauded that order, which "closes the door on attempts at ending the '54 school segregation decision via the school closings and tuition grant tactics."

"We will move quickly to apply it whenever such efforts at school integration evasion occur anywhere in the south, where we are currently pressing 82 separate school integration actions in 14 states."

"This decision will alter the southern school integration picture in hard core areas," he said.

The ruling referred to came down yesterday in the U. S. District Court for the eastern district of Va. Judge John D. Butzner Jr. said that the Surry County school board may no longer process or approve "any applications from persons residing in Surry County for state or county scholarships for use in any school that discriminates in admission and education of pupils on the basis of race."

White students in Surry County have been attending "private" schools on scholarship, while Negroes attended their all-colored "public" schools.
