WOMAN HELD IN BRUTAL SLAYING OF MOTHER

Bloody Body Found Folded In Locked Trunk

A 44-year-old Durham woman, Miss Fannie Evans of 1004 Rock St., is being held by police pending further investigation in the death of her mother, Mrs. Gertrude Evans, 73, of the same address.

The dead woman's body was found Tuesday afternoon in a trunk in the home after the daughter called police at 4:26 p. m. Mrs. Evans, who had worked at the Jack Tar Hotel 30 years as a housekeeper, had been stabbed several times in the top of the head, the shoulders and the chin, according to Coroner Dr. R. Perry. He indicated that the slaying took place late Monday night.

The coroner speculated that the woman was already dead from loss of blood and shock prior to the time her body was stuffed, knees to chin, in the old-fashioned metal trunk.

Sheriff Jennis Mangum said that "Fannie slept in the living room either on the divan, or on a mattress on the floor. The only bed in the house was in the bedroom occupied by her mother."

"Fannie," the sheriff continued, "said that her mother had planned to go to New York Tuesday morning, and she was not apprehensive about her until she noticed the trunk pulled away from the corner. She said she never left the living room all night, but stuck by the television until she went to bed on the divan at 11:15 p. m."

NAACP Blames Apathy of City As Rioting Cause

NEW YORK — The outbreak of violence in Harlem on Sunday, July 18, and in the Bedford-Stuyvesant section of Brooklyn two days later, has been strongly condemned, but a share of the blame is attributed to the apathetic attitude of city officials toward the needs and problems of Negro citizens.

The Rev. Richard A. Hildebrand, president of the New York branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, made this charge in a statement to the press Thursday, July 23.

The disorders which erupted in the two communities, Mr. Hildebrand said, did not originate with the "senseless slaying" of 15-year-old James Powell by a white off-duty police officer. That incident, Mr. Hildebrand asserted, "merely triggered long smoldering and justified resentments stemming from gross neglect of the needs of the people imprisoned in these ghettos."

The Powell boy was shot to death Thursday, July 16, by Police Lieut. Thomas Gilligan. According to Lieut. Gilligan, who has received several citations for bravery, the Negro had

Chicago Bear Stars Killed In Indiana Automobile Accident

Careers Snuffed Out in Tragedy As Players Rush to Beat Curfew

RENSSELAER, IND. (NPI) — A tragic automobile accident this week cut short the careers and snuffed out the lives of two of the most outstanding football stars ever produced by predominantly Negro colleges.

Willie Gallimore, sensational backfield star from Florida A & M University, and John Farrington, an outstanding offensive end from Prairie View were killed instantly Sunday night when their auto missed a curve and overturned near here.

They were rushing back to the Chicago Bears training camp at St. Joseph College to beat an 11 p. m. curfew.

Dan T. Desmond, a spokesman for the Bears, said the accident occurred about 10:25 p. m. He said the Volkswagen in which they were riding, owned by Gallimore, went out of control when it entered a tight "S" curve at about 50 miles per hour.

The World Champion Bears are in training for the College All-Star football game in Chicago on August 7. Gallimore died of multiple

skull fractures in the right temporal region multiple internal injuries and a crushed chest, according to Dr. E. R. Beaver, Jasper county coroner.

Farrington, a four-year veteran from Prairie View College in Texas, also suffered multiple skull fractures.

Both were pronounced dead on arrival at the Jasper County hospital here.

Coroner Beaver attributed the accident to the collapse of a right wheel when it slipped off the shoulder of the country road.

Farrington, 28, joined the Bears in 1961. He had been married following the National League championship, which the Bears won last December.

Gallimore, 20, had been on the bench most of last season due to an off season operation to repair knee injuries. Desmond had been looking forward to a "great season" in 1964.

Gallimore is survived by a wife and three children. Gallimore, a graduate of Florida A & M University, joined the Bears in 1957. He was born

LBJ Asks Henry Ford and Top Businessmen for CR Act Support

WASHINGTON D. C. — President Johnson at a White House luncheon recently called upon Henry Ford II, Roger M. Blough and 240 other captains of American industry to use their influence in support of the Civil Rights law.

In one of the largest meetings of billion-dollar corporation executives ever held, President Johnson said: "I intend to work to ensure that every person enjoys the full constitutional rights and equal opportunity that are his birthright as an American citizen."

The President sought their support saying: "I ask you to use the influence and position and respect which you possess in such abundant measure to persuade others that the law of the land must be obeyed."

The arrival of the business leaders in Washington to meet with the President created a stir at the National Airport. The

executives came in 90 private planes, including a dozen four engine Jet Stars.

This meeting in support of the Civil Rights law was one in a series that the President is calling of leaders in various fields. Friday afternoon the President meets with the leaders of Organized Labor from all over the nation.

The text of the President's remarks to the business executives follows:

Our Constitution and our laws place upon us a duty to provide equal justice to all Americans. To fail to observe this duty attacks the entire structure of ordered liberty on which the life of this nation depends.

I ask you to use the influence and position and respect which you possess in such abundant measure to persuade others that the law of the land must be

White Man Shot In Forced Race

Bias Attempt

ATLANTA (NPI) — A white man was shot and critically wounded here last week as he tried to force a white restaurant owner to keep his business segregated.

Victim of the shooting was Maurice Lawson, who just before had joined a group of other whites in ordering Negroes out of the restaurant, located in a racially mixed neighborhood. Lawson underwent surgery a few hours after the shooting.

Accused of the shooting was Redell Crosby. Crosby told police he shot Lawson when the latter picked up a bottle and threatened to "come behind that bar and bust you brains out."

Meanwhile, in another incident, a white man and his young son were slightly injured by a shotgun blast that shattered the window of their car. They said it was fired from a car containing two Negroes.

Wounded in the auto shooting were Arthur B. Keith and his son, Wylie Leon, 12. Georgia Gov. Carl Sanders has ordered state investigators to probe the shooting.

Edmonds and Pittman Replace Brown and Kyle as School Heads

NEW YORK — Terming Republican Presidential nominee Barry Goldwater a "captive" of the right-wing extremists he espoused in his acceptance address before the GOP convention, former baseball star Jackie Robinson urged Negroes to unite behind President Lyndon B. Johnson to defeat the Arizona senator.

Robinson issued the blast at Goldwater in an article written for the New York Tribune News Service.

Robinson, the first Negro to break into organized baseball, denounced those among Goldwater's followers who he said masquerade as fighters of communism, but whose "real motive is to take over our nation and subject it to a rule of dictatorship and repression every inch as vicious as communism."

In urging Negroes to back President Johnson, Jackie said: "There is a challenge to the Negro people — a challenge to fight in the precincts, in the churches, in the union halls, a fight to effect that kind of unity behind Lyndon B. Johnson which will ensure that Goldwaterism and extremism and anti-Negroism will be so brutally defeated that they can never again threaten the future of America."

In his acceptance speech before the GOP national convention in San Francisco recently, Goldwater declared that "extremism in the defense of liberty is no vice" and that "moderation is no virtue."

Demonstrators Undaunted By Guardsmen In Rioting Spree

Copter Crash Tragedy Brings Pause in Clashes

ROCHESTER, N. Y. (NPI) — The prediction that it would be a "long hot summer for civil rights" has turned out to be a fact and especially in the state of New York, and to a lesser extent in Iowa.

Last week, the scene of racial demonstrations shifted from New York City — where Negroes took umbrage over the slaying of a youth by a white policeman — to Rochester, when some 1,000 Negroes and whites became involved in rioting touched off by the arrest of a Negro at a street dance.

Though the city's entire police force was mobilized for duty in a 50-block area, they were unable to contain and quiet the street-fighting, looting and burning which resulted. Before dawn Sunday, City Manager Porter Hoier had declared a state of emergency and petitioned Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller for state police assistance.

Later, the governor ordered 1,000 national guardsmen into the city to assist the local police and state troopers in halting the wholesale damage to property and persons.

The rioting had its beginning when two policemen were summoned to arrest a Negro reportedly causing trouble at a street dance in a Negro area near

Suspension of New York Police Official Sought By NAACP

NEW YORK — A group of Harlem political, civic and religious leaders, headed by the Rev. Richard A. Hildebrand, president of the New York Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, has demanded that police officer who killed a 15-year-old Negro lad, touching off five days of rioting in Harlem and Brooklyn, be suspended, pending the outcome of a thorough and unbiased investigation by a group outside the police department.

The suspension of Police Lieut. Thomas Gilligan was one of five demands presented to Acting Mayor Paul R. Serevan in a meeting Monday, July 20, designed to remove the cause which might lead to further racial disorders. At the time of the meeting Mayor Robert Wagner was vacationing in Europe.

News Service for New Generation Is Organized

CHICAGO (NPI) — The birth of NEGRO PRESS INTERNATIONAL, a comprehensive news and feature service, piloted by young journalists under the motto of "A News Service for a New Generation," was announced here this week.

Lee Blackwell, 35-year-old former managing editor of the Chicago Daily Defender and editor of the Associated Negro Press, is organizer and will serve as president and managing director of the new service. The organization will be diversified and international in scope, seeking business and providing service not only in this country and Africa, but throughout the world.

The Chicago headquarters office of NPI is located at 5708 S. State Street, which formerly housed The National News Company, a pioneer Negro newspaper and magazine distributing firm.

With Blackwell is J. Henry Randall, former ANP staff member. A veteran journalist, he will serve as Chicago office manager and Chief of the NPI Foreign Desk.

Two other former ANP staff members hold key positions in the new organization. Adolph J. Slaughter, a former Defender police reporter before

Dixie Solons Call For Civil Rights Law Compliance

WASHINGTON — Dixie solons who had been blatantly uncompromising in their attacks on the civil rights bill during debate in the Senate, are now resolutely calling for its compliance.

Among those now advocating compliance with law in varying respect are Sen. Richard Russell, who led the Southern's attack on the bill; the staunch pro-segregationist, Sen. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina; Russell's fellow Atlantian, Sen. Herman Talmadge, and Sen. J. Ellender of Louisiana, another firm segregationist.

Denouncing opposition by violence, Russell said in a speech before an Area Development commission in Rome, Ga., that most Georgians were outraged "by the brutal and senseless murder of a Negro reserve of fiercer upon our public highways a few days ago." He referred to the ambush slaying of Lemuel
