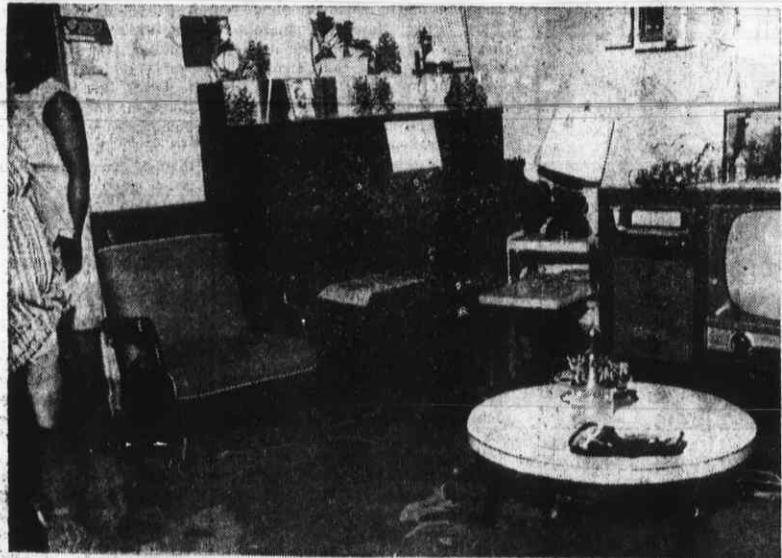

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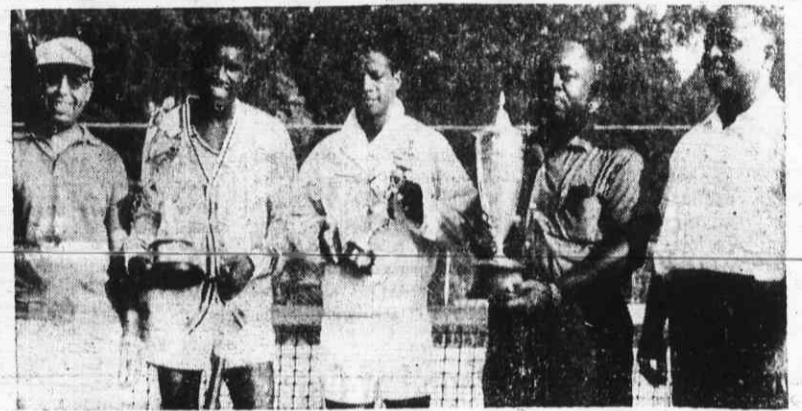
## NAACP Demands End To Virginia Private Schools

### Suit is Filed in U. S. District Court August 17

**RICHMOND, VA.** — In a massive suit against the Virginia State Board of Education, the state Superintendent of Public Instruction and several Virginia school boards, filed in U. S. District Court here Aug. 17, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People seeks to end the practice of publicly-supported private schools for white children in the state.

In efforts to prevent court-ordered public school integration, several school systems in the state, including the notorious Prince Edward County system, set up private schools and appropriated public funds for their support. The schools have been maintained for education of white children only.

Named in the NAACP suit filed to end state-supported school segregation are the Boards of Supervisors in Prince Edward County, Powhatan County, Warren County, Surry County, Charlottesville, Norfolk, Amelia County, King and Queen County and Brunswick County. The Board's statutory function is to supply funds for public education.

### \$25,000 Bond Set For Slayers Of D. C. Teacher

**DANIELSVILLE, Ga.** — After four hours of deliberation three former Ku Klux Klansmen were indicted Tuesday by a grand jury for murder in the death of Lemuel Penn, a Negro educator of Washington, D. C.

The three, named in this rural county seat of 362 persons, were Cecil William Myers, 25; James Lackey, 29; and Joseph Howard Sims, 41, all of nearby Athens, Ga.

Herbert Guest, 37, a fourth suspect who was listed as a conspirator in the slaying in the original FBI civil rights warrant, was not indicted.

Solicitor General Clete Johnson said the grand jury was not presented a case against Guest who is being held under \$25,000 bond on a federal charge.

Penn, who was riding in a car in the early morning darkness of July 11 with two companions enroute back to Washington after training as Army reserve officers at Fort Benning, Ga., was killed by a shotgun blast fired by night-riders from another automobile. He was a lieutenant colonel in the reserves.

A judge indicated that when the three former klansmen are tried, perhaps next week, decorum will be so strict that no "chewing of gum or enewing of tobacco, drinking of soft drinks or eating peanuts" in the courtroom will be permitted.

According to reports, Negroes are on the jury lists.

John W. Williford, the court-appointed lawyer for Lackey, said he would file a federal suit to bar FBI agents from appearing at the trial, alleging that such an appearance would violate the civil rights of his client.

Solicitor General Johnson remarked that the suit would have "no merit."

### Last Rites Held For Benj. Davis In New York

**NEW YORK** — Funeral services for Benjamin J. Davis, 60, long-time spokesman for Harlem and former member of the Council of the City of New York, were held here Wednesday, August 26.

Born in Dawson, Ga., Davis was the son of the late Benjamin J. Davis, Sr., who served for many years as editor of the Atlanta Independent, a militant newspaper dedicated to advancing the Negro's freedom struggle.

An athlete and a musician in his younger days, Davis died Aug. 22 at Beth Israel Hospital following a long illness. He was a graduate of Amherst College where he played football, and received his degree in law from Harvard Law School in 1932. After taking his law degree he established practice in Atlanta, but went to New York in 1935 to become editor of the weekly newspaper, the Negro Liberator.

In subsequent years he championed the cause of oppressed Negroes and Puerto Ricans in Harlem, fought for fair employment practices, and initiated campaigns for low-income housing.

### HARASS BLIND MAN WHO GAVE PARTY FOR CORE

**TUSCON, Arizona** — Charles Hamill, a 72-year old, blind retired manufacturer who offered his swimming pool for a fundraising party for Tuscon CORE, has been harassed in a manner reminiscent of the deep south.

On the eve of the party, he had received several threatening telephone calls from persons accusing him of being a "nigger-lover" and "Communist" and warning him to "beware of the dark."

## National Insurance Ass'n Adds Support To Registration Drive

**CHICAGO**—The National Insurance Association, a trade group of 47 Negro owned life insurance companies, has called on members and their employees to support voter registration drives among Negroes.

The action was authorized in a

resolution adopted during the organization's 44th annual convention in Philadelphia last month. It got underway with the appointment of a ten member committee by Atty. Benjamin J. Johnson of New Orleans, president.

Jesse Hill, Jr., actuary of Atlanta Life Insurance Co., Atlanta, was named chairman. Atty. Earl B. Dickerson of Chicago president of Supreme Life Insurance Co., and author of the resolution, was named co-chairman.

The resolution emphasized that the voter registration effort be non-partisan. In operation, an estimated 8,000 field employees of NIA companies will urge members of over a million Negro households to register in time for the presidential election, if they have not already done so. Committee members have been requested to cooperate with national, regional and local organizations engaging in similar non-partisan efforts, and copies of the resolution have been sent to the headquarters of civil rights and voter registration organizations.
