Last Rites Held For Benj. Davis In New York

for Benjamin J. Davis, 60, longime spokeman for Harlem and former member of the Council of the City of New York, were held here Wednesday, August 26.

Born in Dawson, Ga., Davis was the son of the late Benjamin J. Davis, Sr., who served for many years as editor of the Atlanta Independent, a militant newspaper dedicated to advancing the Ne-gro's freedom struggle.

An athlete and a musician in his younger days, Davis died Aug. 22 at Beth Israel Hospital following a long illness. He was a grad-uate of Amherst College where he played football, and received his degree in law from Harvard Law School in 1932. After taking practice in Atlanta, but went to New York in 1935 to become edi-Negro Liberator.

In subsequent years he pioned the cause of oppressed Ne groes and Puerto Ricans in Harlem, fought for fair employment practices, and initiated campaigns for low-income nousing.
