### Durham Woman First Of N. C. As Receptionist For First Lady

In her capacity as a member of the official Reception Committee from the Durham County Democratic Executive Committee to meet Mrs. Lyndon Johnson and her party, Miss Ellen Warren, vice chairman of the Whitted Precinct, chalked up a "first" for this area as a participant in receptions for the First Lady in Durham, Burlington, and Greensboro after boarding the Lady Bird Special in Durham, she became the first Negro woman in the tarheel area to serve in such a capacity.

Miss Warren, when asked what she and the First Lady talked about, stated that "Mrs. Johnson showed considerable interest in my long record of participation in the political affairs of Durham County, and encouraged my continued efforts in behalf of her husband, Lyndon Johnson, for president of our country."

At the present time Miss Warren is involved in a massive voter registration drive taking place throughout the City and County of Durham. Workers are well organized and supplied with name bills and voter registration information.

Precinct by precinct, every door will be knocked on and every possible voter will be urged to exercise their right to vote.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The National Council of Negro Women will hold its 29th National Convention, November 11-15 at the Sheraton-Park Hotel in Washington, D. C. It will be their 28th meeting in the nation's capital.

"The Challenge of Poverty," the convention theme, sets forth the nature and scope of the 29th Annual Convention.

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## Halifax Youth Winner Of 1964 4-H Club Honor

### Joe Whitaker One of 39 to Get Free Trip

HALIFAX—Joseph Daniel Whitaker, 17, has become the first North Carolina Negro ever to win a position as a delegate to the National 4-H Club Congress. The son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Whitaker of Halifax was one of 39 Tar Heel boys and girls who have been selected to share the top state 4-H Club honors for 1964. Winners in that category and 25 others are the state's official delegates to the National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago, November 28-December 3, along with six other winners to be announced later.

Whitaker's expenses on the trip will be paid by International Harvester Company.

D. J. Knight, Halifax County Extension Agent, said white and colored 4-H'ers have competed together on the state level for three years now. He said that for the first two years, Whitaker tried to win in the achievement category but fell short of victory. This year the boy switched to the agricultural program category and nabbed the voted prize.

Whitaker is a senior at Brawley High School in Scotland Neck. The Youth has been in club work seven years, completing 41 projects in sweet potatoes, swine, peanuts, cotton, corn, cucumbers, water-

melons, commercial vegetables (lima beans, field peas and turnip green), dairy, poultry, canning, frozen food and tree identification.

He has made 14 state exhibits, exhibited the grand champion bush of sweet potatoes at the Northeastern district show and sale, in 1960 and had first place entries in the Junior Sweet Potatoes Division at North Carolina State Fair in Raleigh 1964, 1963 and 1962 and had the second place entry in 1961.

### Martin Luther King Calls for Crushing Defeat of Goldwater

NEW YORK — Declaring that this is the most crucial and critical election in the history of the nation, the Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Sunday called upon Negroes to give a crushing defeat to Senator Barry Goldwater on Nov. 3.

Speaking as a guest preacher at the Antioch Baptist church in the Bedford-Stuyvesant district of Brooklyn, the leader of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference said that the "negative" attitudes of the Republican Presidential candidate on human, political and constitutional questions had compelled him to demand a crushing defeat for the Arizona.

Dr. King's remarks followed closely behind a national conference held a week ago in Georgia where he urged a national "Get out the vote" campaign among the six million registered Negro voters.

"I can think of nothing more important than for all the people of good will to go to the polls Nov. 3," Dr. King said. "This is the most critical and crucial election in the history of the nation. I don't hate Goldwater. I don't hate anyone. But I believe that Goldwater really believes in what he has been saying."

The great moral and spiritual leader of the American Negro said that there was something deeper involved in the election than the candidacy of Senator Goldwater. He called it "Goldwaterism."

He said the Senator has endorsed a philosophy that could destroy the nation. A defeat by a small majority would not be enough because that would leave "Goldwaterism" and "Goldwaterism" must be totally defeated.

Miss Mary Catherine Williams, chairman of the college's Student Government Association's parade committee, indicates that the SGA has received commitments from approximately 65 groups which will participate in the parade, scheduled to begin at 9:30 a.m. Saturday. Both campus and community organizations and firms will be represented by floats and decorated automobiles.

Included will be twelve campus and three off-campus floats and twenty-two campus and four off-campus automobiles.

In addition, he is a member of the executive board of the West Virginia Council of Churches.
