bail be set, and that no further arrests be made for voter registration activities.
On October 15, trial was held before a special three-judge court

consisting of 5th Circuit Justice Griffin B. Bell, and District Judges J. Robert Elliott and William A. Boatle. The Court requested the papers filed recently by the Legal Defense Fund.
Legal Defense Fund attorneys pointed out that the Georgia insurrection statute was first held

unconstitutional by the U. S. Supreme Court in 1957, and that this opinion was reaffirmed last year. They charged that it violated freedom of speech, and is so vague as to delineate no reasonable standards of guilt.
Handling the case for the NAACP Legal Defense Fund are C. B. King of Albany, and Director Counsel Jack Greenberg, Charles H. Jones, Jr., and Charles S. Ralston of New York.

the Negro into the Southern community.
Sanford cites demonstrations as one of the factors which led to the changing status of the Negro. "Incredible as it seems," he writes, "we Southerners have to learn.
"We grew up with misconceptions, more than prejudices. We had lived with our myths for so long that we actually believed the vast majority of Negroes were content, happy, carefree, lacking in ambition and singing in the sun."
"How could we understand the feeling of the high-school student who had just seen the school's valedictorian of five years earlier working on a garbage truck? How could we understand that even the meanest sorriest whites-only restaurant was a daily burden to the Negro—a reminder that he was second-class?"
The Governor declares that it is commendable that the Negro is no longer silent and comments favorably on the generation which seeks an end to indignities and indignities "now."
However, he warns, "The Negro must realize that mass demonstrations—so useful in altering the white community—have reached the point of diminishing returns."
In many instances, as the demonstrations deteriorate into violence, civil disobedience or mob action, they destroy goodwill, create resentment and lose friends."
He cites as an example the defeat of gubernatorial candidate Richardson Preyer, "a candidate pledged to continue the North Carolina policies designed to improve race relations, by Dan K. Moore, a candidate who neither embraced nor repudiated these policies."
"If the Negro could gain the help of white Southerners, his battle would be won. Yet so long as the Negro draws his impression of all white Southerners from the activities of white supremacists, he will consider the white man his "enemy," and fashion a strategy that offends those who could help him most."
"I am not urging the Negro to go slow," he declares. "That would be futile advice. Rather, I am saying that the Negro must develop a more sensitive 'feel' for the thinking white man if he is to prosecute his cause most effectively."

"Many of the attorneys expressed their astonishment upon learning that the NAACP's nominating committee failed to list his name this year," Tucker said.
However, filing of an independent petition for re-election to the NAACP National Board as a member-at-large, has assured Ming's place on the ballot.
"We regard Bob Ming as a great fighter and an attorney of vast ability who is widely respected across the country by members of the legal profession," Tucker continued.
Attorney Ming was among lawyers who prepared the historic school segregation cases that brought about the 1954 Supreme Court ruling.
More recently, he has worked on the numerous Sit-in cases that have gone to the Supreme Court.
