### Desire, Not Skills Won Flag Says Aggie Coach

GREENSBORO—"What we lacked in talent, was more than made up in desire and hustle," is the way Bert Piggott, head coach, describes his 1964 edition of the A. and T. College Aggies, the team which had won the CIAA football championship before the season had ended.

"We have had more ball players who had much more skill, but this bunch of fellows were the finest lot that I have ever coached... they were willing and able to learn," Piggott added.

The Aggies were announced champs two full days prior to their important engagement with arch-rivals, the North Carolina College Eagles. This did not phase the team at all. They wanted to win that game, more than other... and did, 26-0.

After a shaky start, losing the first two engagements to non-conference foes, the Aggies collected their lives into a smooth working unit. Except for a tie by Maryland State College, 8-8, and a loss to powerful Florida A. and M. University, the team mowed down one team after another. They finished with a 6-0-1 conference record and 6-3-1 overall.

Unlike in previous years, there was no galaxy of stars. Only about four players got the rave notices. These included Cornell Gordon, the quarterback who close observers term the college's All-time great; Ronald Francis, an end; Willie Beasley, at fullback, and Clifford Matthews, a halfback. The other players were just "good team players."

Piggott says the success came mainly from improvement in the interior line, composed chiefly of sophomores and juniors on both sides. The defense was jelled by late season and was a tough crew to handle.

### NCC Eagles Win Second CIAA Encounter From Va. State Trojans

North Carolina College snapped a 19-19 deadlock midway the second period and went on to score an easy 84-73 victory over invading Virginia State here Saturday night in a CIAA basketball encounter.

It was the second straight league triumph for the homesteading Eagle quintet and game them a 2-1 over-all record. Coach Floyd Brown's only loss came at the expense of Mt. St. Mary's in their last outing, 100-80.

The visiting Trojans jumped out to a 9-4 lead in the early going before the outside shooting of NCC's Ted Manning closed the gap to 19-19 with 7:20 left before the halftime break.

Manning lead the Eagles in the scoring column with 26 markers, but the Trojans' Eugene Nelson, a freshman, took down game-scoring honors with 28 points.

NCC held a 36-28 advantage at the intermission and steadily increased its margin the rest of the game, maintaining a 12-14 point bulge until the final buzzer.

Albert Conner and Daniel McClain shared runnerup scoring honors for the Eagles with 10 points each. Rodney Looney poured in 15 for the Trojans as Looney and Nelson combined to tally over half of the Virginians total output.

The Eagles face Johnson C. Smith of Charlotte in their next game. NCC's next home engagement is Tuesday, Dec. 15, against St. Augustine's College of Raleigh. The lineups:

The CIAA title was the third that Piggott coached-teams have brought to the college. Closing out his eighth year, Piggott's boys won the title in six previous years and only once during his career as head coach at A. and has his teams finished below second place.

### West Overpowers East in Annual Shrine Bowl Game at O'Kelly Field

The Western All-Stars scored 22 points in the second quarter and coasted to a 28-12 win over the Eastern All-Stars Saturday afternoon on N. C. College's O'Kelly Field in the annual Shrine Youth Bowl game.

Larry Burns from Dunbar High (Lexington) was voted the Most Outstanding Player in the game. The 190-pound fullback scored two touchdowns, blocked a punt and recovered a fumble to set up a third, and ran a two-point conversion to break the backs of the Eastern All-Stars almost single-handedly. He gained 40 yards in seven carries to lead the ground attack for the West.

Some 2,500 fans gathered to see the Senior Bowl contest played on a rain-soaked field during a continuous downpour. A total of 11 fumbles occurred during the game with the East dropping six.

Xavier Artis of Ligon (Raleigh) took the game's opening kickoff and raced 105-yards for the contest's first score. Artis, a 154-pounder, caught the ball five yds. deep in his own end zone and scampered all the way down the middle of the field. Daniel Ward of Darden (Wilson) attempted a kick for the conversion but the boot was to the right and the East, coached by Pete Williams of Ligon and William Peerman of Chapel Hill's Lincoln High, enjoyed the lead, 6-0.

The West took the ensuing kickoff and marched 69 yards in 10 plays. Burns climaxed the drive with a two-yard plunge in the early moments of the second stanza. Burns also tallied the two-point conversion and the Westerners were home free with their 8-6 lead—one they never relinquished.

The East fumbled on the first play following the kickoff and Willie Pearson of Carver (Winston-Salem) fell on the loose ball for the West at the East 47. In six plays, the West scored again when quarterback Talmadge Hill of Atkins (Winston-Salem) tossed a perfect 30-yard scoring aerial to end Vernon Walker of William Penn (High Point) for the score. An attempted run for the PAT was foiled.

### World Champion Jim Clark Named Motor Sportsman of the Year

Jim Clark of Scotland, the current World's Driving Champion, is the winner of this year's Martini & Rossi Trophy as Motor Sportsman of the Year. The trophy was presented to Clark in Sebring, Florida, during the 12 hour race there.

At 28, Clark is the youngest driver ever to win the world's championship. Last year he was a close second in the 500-mile Memorial Day race at Indianapolis in his first attempt at oval racing.

He then went on to win the next four world championship events in a row. Clark won seven Grand Prix world championship races last year, more of these events in one season than any other driver in history.

The quiet young Scotsman, already considered one of the greatest driving champions in the history of the sport, was chosen to receive the Martini & Rossi Trophy on the basis of votes cast by sports car enthusiasts all over the country.
