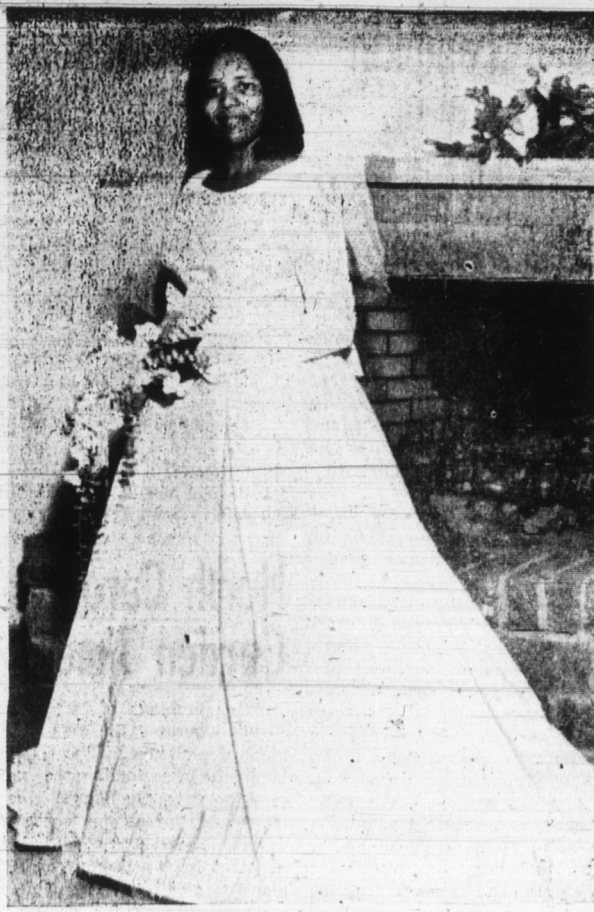
YEAR ROUND GARDEN CLUB MEETS WITH MRS. B. PEELE

PINEAPPLE-ORANGE SALADS
(Makes 8-10 servings)

- 1 cup (8 1/2 ounce can) crushed pineapple
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- Pineapple syrup plus water to make 1 cup
- 1/2 cup chopped orange slices
- 3/4 cup chopped celery
- 1 package (3 ounce) lemon-flavored gelatin
- 3/2 cup (small can) undiluted CARNATION EVAPORATED MILK
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice

Drain pineapple, save syrup. Heat syrup and water to boiling. Pour over gelatin. Stir until gelatin is dissolved. Chill until consistency of unbeaten egg white. Stir pineapple, mayonnaise, orange slices and celery into gelatin. Chill Carnation in refrigerator tray until soft ice crystals form around edges of tray (10-15 minutes). Whip until stiff (about 1 minute). Add lemon juice and whip very stiff (1 minute longer). Fold whipped Carnation into gelatin mixture. Spoon into 8 to 10 individual molds. Chill until firm, about 2 hours. Unmold on lettuce leaves and garnish with orange slices and coconut.

Kitchen-wise

Main Dish of Leftover Vegetables

Leftover vegetables can be transformed into an attractive main dish called a "timbale." Puree the cooked vegetables by rubbing them through a sieve.

- VEGETABLE TIMBALE**
- 4 eggs
 - 1 1/2 cups milk, scalded
 - 2 cups pureed, cooked vegetables
 - 1 teaspoon Lec & Perrins
 - Worcestershire Sauce
 - 1 teaspoon onion juice
 - Salt, pepper and garlic to taste
- Beat eggs slightly; gradually stir in scalded milk. Add pureed vegetables and seasonings; mix well. Pour mixture into a well-greased ring mold or custard cups, set in a shallow pan of hot water, and bake in moderate oven (350°F.) for 45 to 60 minutes, or until firm. Individual timbales will require a shorter baking time than one large one. Unmold and serve with tomato sauce. (Serves 6)

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
