NCC Professor Awarded Post-**Doctoral Grant**

Dr. Marjorie Lee Browne, professor of mathematics and chair man of the Desartment of Mathe matic; at North Carolina College. has/been award a National Science Foundation scence faculty fellowship for study iring the 1965-66 school year.

This is the third post-doctoral fellowship received by the NCC mathematician. In 1952-53 she was a Ford fellow at Cambridge University, Cambridge, England. In 1958-59 she studied as a National Science Foundation fellow at the University of California at Los Angeles.

Provisions of the 1965-66 grant nclude the matching of her salary at NCC, round trip travel, funds for travel to professional meetings, and a cost-of-education allowance which covers all tuition and assessed fees at the university

Dr. Browne expects to study at University of California at Berkeley for a 10-1/2-month period beginning on or about September 15. 1965. Her proposed activities will include independent study which will permit two concentrationson recent advances in topology and functional analysis and on the pplications of topology and computer sciences un medicine.

A native of Memphis, Tenn, Dr. Browne is holder of the B.S. de gree from Howard University and the M. S. and Ph.D. degrees from the University of Michigan. A member of the NCC faculty since 1949, she taught earlier at Gilbert Academy, New Orleans, La.; Wiley College, Marshall, Tex.; and part time at the University of Michigan. In 1951 she was appointed to the chairmanship of the NCC Department of Mathematics.

Saying . . . Civil rights demonstrators have been singing, "We Shall Overcome" whenever and wherever protest marches and meetings were held during the last five years. At first there were only small groups who knew and

chanted the slow-moving Free dom song. Then as the social revolution picked up speed and support, "We Shall Overcome" became the theme song of larger and larger groups. Now it is sung with fervor at almost every gath ering where citizens are fighting

for their rights. Monday night, the hearts of men of goodxill everywhere were touched when President Lyndon Baines Johnson incorporated the words "We Shall overcome" in the stirring ad Congress and to the nation calling upon America to end the discrimination and segregation which he said Negroes have suffered for 100 years.

In a compelling speech in which he made it clear to the South and the nation that he means business. President Johnson asked Congress to pass with out delay a broad voting rights bill which will prevent places like Selma from denving citizens the right to vote simply because of the color of their skin.

He urged Congress to work nights, Sundays and week-ends i necessary to pass a bill which will knock out the ingenious methods devised by southern of ficials, to keep Negroes, from passing so-called, literacy tests. And the President said that if southern officials refuse to register Negroes, officials of the federal government will do so. President Johnson also gave his blessing to street demonstrations

in a peaceful manner. it was gratifying to hear the President of the United States throw the entire weight of the federal government behind the civil rights movement. The speech has been acclaimed everywhere as the strongest speech on human rights ever made by any President.

Those who have said that President Johnson was slow in taking a stand on the Selma situation must have the feeling now that what the chief executive said Monday night was "worth waiting for."

The American people must now call upon the Congress to pass the voting rights bill without delay. There is no need to drag through countless months of hearings. If our Congressmen and Senators will fall in line behind our President, surely in short order "we shall overcome." -The Call
